Establishment

On March 19, 1990, Human Access for Partnership and Development (HUMAN ACCESS) was established by a group of volunteers and social leaders to stand up for the vulnerable, needy, and afflicted of Yemen and help achieve sustainable and comprehensive development based on the humanitarian dimension and not influenced by any other motives.



Objectives

- Achieving the reduction of hunger, poverty, and unemployment in Yemen.
- Contribute to the improvement of basic services for underprivileged communities.
- Ensure food security and promote sustainable and comprehensive development.
- Revitalize the spirit of solidarity and social cohesion, and encourage a culture of volunteer work.
- Provide economic and employment opportunities, enhance livelihoods, and provide protection and dignity for the vulnerable.
- Aid in mitigating the effects of natural disasters, climate change, humanitarian crises, and conflicts.
- Support and assist the most vulnerable groups, such as children, women, youth, orphans, displaced persons, refugees, and people with special needs.
- Develop partnerships with donors and philanthropists, expand humanitarian efforts, and reach the largest number of people in need inside and outside Yemen.

HUMAN ACCESS implements projects throughout Yemen through its branches and partners, and is backed by a large network of qualified staff and volunteers.

The association also has an office in the Republic of Djibouti, implementing humanitarian projects to meet the needs of thousands of Yemeni refugees there, in addition to supporting their host communities.

HUMAN ACCESS plans to establish several additional overseas offices, based on its belief that humanitarian missions are necessary under different circumstances, at all times, and in all places.

Areas of work and priorities

Additionally, it emphasizes priority areas such as food, health, shelter, education, protection, water, sanitation, livelihoods, among others, through comprehensive needs assessments and collaboration with partners and authorities.

HUMAN ACCESS and Sustainable Development Goals

HUMAN ACCESS has diversified its contributions to address the following objectives:

Goal 2: Completely eradicate hunger by implementing food security projects and distributing food baskets to the most vulnerable groups.

Goal 3: Good health and well-being through an integrated approach to maintaining priority health interventions, with a special focus on children and women.

Goal 4: Quality education by supporting and rehabilitating the educational infrastructure, providing an appropriate learning

environment for male and female students, and providing basic educational needs for vulnerable groups.

Goal 5: Gender equality by focusing on and addressing the challenges faced by the most vulnerable women and girls and marginalized groups.

Goal 6: Clean water and sanitation by providing access to safe drinking water, sanitation, and hygiene services for populations in the most vulnerable communities.

Goal 7: Affordable and Clean Energy. Distributing clean energy, such as solar energy, as one of the most important renewable energy sources, enhances resilience to climate change. This also contributed to achieving Sustainable Development Goal 13, which is climate action.

Goal 8: Decent work and economic growth through investment in economic empowerment, training and qualifications, and the creation of economic projects that meet labor market needs.

Contributing to achieving Goal 16: Peace, justice, and strong institutions by building the capacity of civil society organizations and promoting values of transparency.

Contributing to achieving Goal 17: Partnerships to achieve the goals by forming successful partnerships with official institutions, the private sector, and civil society.






































Food Aid:

A Crucial Lifeline for Ibtidaa Hamoud's Family

Ibtidaa Hamoud, 43, found herself alone, facing harsh burdens after the death of her husband, the family's sole breadwinner. She was responsible for providing food for her five children, and she lacked a steady source of income. Donations from charitable people sometimes came, but often didn't.

Ibtidaa, who lives in a neighborhood in Al-Qahirah district in Taiz Governorate, described her tragic situation: "The world has darkened for me with the death of my husband. My children want food, and we don't even have enough to eat. Our lives are harsh, and all I can do is cry and suffer."

As the protracted crisis in Yemen has worsened, all options have vanished, and the family is now facing severe hunger. Ibtidaa confirms, "My children and I spend many nights without eating anything. I sold my belongings to cover basic needs. My debts have

increased, and I have been unable to pay them back or borrow from relatives."

In such a tragic situation, the General Food Aid (GFA) project, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS and funded by WFP, provided a lifeline for this vulnerable family, providing them with periodic food aid consisting of basic food items, such as flour, cooking oil, and legumes, enabling them to survive.

Commenting on this vital aid, which the family eagerly awaited, she began by saying, "You saved me and my children from starvation. You provided me with the basic necessities for daily life. Without this aid, I would not have been able to provide for my children and satisfy their hunger. My situation is better now."



1. Relief and Food Assistance

Food assistance is a top priority for HUMAN ACCESS, especially during these difficult times in Yemen, with alarming levels of food insecurity and a growing number of people in need of assistance due to the consequences of conflict and climate change.

Efforts undertaken with the support of partners in 2024 benefited more than 800,000 people who received basic food supplies, including flour, ghee, sugar, and rice, in addition to ready-to-eat meals and cash assistance to cover essential needs and respond to immediate crises.

All of this vital assistance targeted people already in dire need of humanitarian aid. It represents a victory for basic human rights, most importantly the right to food, and will contribute to achieving Sustainable Development Goal 2 on ending hunger.

2. General Food Aid (GFA) Project

Contributing to addressing food insecurity in Yemen, the General Food Aid (GFA) Project, funded by the World Food Program (WFP), is a remarkable example of the noble humanitarian role played by HUMAN ACCESS. This project, funded by WFP, covers the food needs of those in need and affected, as a humanitarian priority amidst the horrific humanitarian crisis.

During 2024, this vital project reached more than 891,000 people from the most vulnerable and impoverished groups in Lahj and Taiz governorates. Its services involved the distribution of food baskets to meet the basic food needs of targeted families.

Cash assistance is also provided, as it is one of the fastest, most efficient, and most effective ways to support vulnerable people to meet their most urgent needs, including food. It also allows families sufficient flexibility to make their own choices and has positive impacts on communities by stimulating local markets and economies.

3. Ramadan Food Projects

Based on its humanitarian responsibility toward the most vulnerable groups, HUMAN ACCESS has long-standing experience in implementing Ramadan charity projects. These seasonal projects significantly contribute to alleviating the burdens on those in need.

These projects include distributing food baskets, setting up iftar tables, delivering ready-to-eat meals, dates, meat, and Zakat al-Fitr, with the aim of creating hope for the poor and needy during the holy month and bringing joy and happiness to the homes of needy families.

Donor support contributed to delivering these projects' services during 2024 to more than 328,000 beneficiaries in Yemen and Djibouti, a significant achievement amidst numerous living crises, most notably rising prices.

Many beneficiaries expressed their deep gratitude to HUMAN ACCESS and its donors for contributing, through this generous assistance, to making Ramadan a season of joy and worship.

4. Sacrificial Meat Project

Since Yemen is one of the poorest countries in the world, access to red meat has become increasingly unattainable for a large segment of Yemenis, depriving them of one of their most important food sources. Even the sacrifice is no longer an annual meat supply for them; it has become unavailable due to the exorbitant prices and deteriorating living, financial, and economic conditions.

Therefore, the sacrificial meat distribution projects are an opportunity to support and assist families living in extremely difficult living conditions, allowing them to share the joy of this blessed religious occasion with others.

With the support of generous donations and HUMAN ACCESS efforts, more than half a million people from the most vulnerable groups were able to eat meat during the blessed days of Eid al-Adha, making their Eid a day of joy and happiness.

5. Food and Cash Assistance for Orphans

HUMAN ACCESS stands with orphans in Yemen as a humanitarian and moral duty, as they need continuous support and special care, especially the young, to secure their basic needs and improve their living conditions.

With funding from partners, more than 68,000 male and female orphans in six Yemeni governorates benefited from food and cash assistance during 2024. This humanitarian support made a positive difference in the lives of the orphans and strengthened their resilience amidst an environment filled with challenges, obstacles, and pain.

This food and cash assistance reflects the bright humanitarian face and unwavering commitment to serving and caring for orphaned children, whose numbers have doubled due to the war and conflict in the country and who are in dire need of someone to compensate for the loss of their fathers.

A New Health Dawn Rises in Al-Faidami District

For more than a decade, the health center in Al-Faidami region, Al-Mahrah Governorate, was unable to receive a single delivery, and most women and girls faced difficulty accessing basic reproductive health services.

The medical staff there summarized the dire situation the center had reached, saying, "Once, we had to perform a delivery using a mobile phone light, and another time, a delivery was performed on the floor due to the lack of even the most basic medical facilities."

People from the region and its surrounding areas had to travel long distances to receive medical care, and during these long journeys, some women and newborns died, according to local residents.

It was a dream to provide support for this health facility, which

serves thousands of women in these rural areas and reduces the health risks for women and girls in need of reproductive health services. Now, this dream has been realized with the health voucher program. Through the UNFPA-funded Reproductive Health Services Support Project, HUMAN ACCESS provided the necessary support to enable the health center to provide reproductive health services, including medicines, medical supplies, and other items.

Thanks to this support, residents no longer need to endure the burdens and inconvenience of traveling to obtain these life-saving services. As Asma Omar, a resident of the area, said, "Today we are very blessed, and we thank you for providing us with services essential to our survival."



1. Supporting Reproductive Health Services

From Hodeida in the west to Hadhramaut and Al-Mahrah in the east, passing through Lahj and Taiz, the Reproductive Health Services Support Project has been a lifeline for the most vulnerable groups, given the importance of these services in preserving human life.

This project, implemented within the framework of the strategic partnership between HUMAN ACCESS and UNFPA, achieved significant progress in the field of reproductive health during 2024, benefiting more than 228,000 people from its life-saving services.

This included family planning services, awareness campaigns, pre-and postnatal services, and other services provided through 15 health facilities. These services contributed to enhancing access to maternal and newborn health services and improving the quality of reproductive health services, which have become a global sustainable development priority.

2. Supporting the Integrated Response to Improve Ba sic Services

Taiz is one of the Yemeni cities most affected by the conflict, and most of its residents face severe challenges in accessing basic health services. There is an urgent need to restore access to these services and expand health cover-

The Integrated Response to Improve Basic Services project, funded by Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF), is one of the most important projects implemented by HUMAN ACCESS association in 2024 in Taiz, specifically in Al-Mudhaffar and Al-Qahirah districts.

The project was highly acclaimed by local authorities, given its significant role in supporting vulnerable communities. It was also praised by the beneficiaries, who exceeded 173,000 people, after they were able to access vital health services, including the dispensing of medicines and a referral system for patients in need of advanced medical care in hospitals.

3. Integrated and Sustainable Assistance to Meet **Needs**

More than 255,000 people in Al-Wadi and Khabb wa Al-Sha'af districts of Marib and Al-Jawf governorates benefited during 2024 from the Integrated and Sustainable Assistance to Meet Needs project, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS in partnership with the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF).

The beneficiaries of this pioneering project are vulnerable population groups in a country classified as one of the poorest Arab countries, amid one of the most challenging humanitarian crises in the world.

They received critical services, including immunization services for a future where no child dies from a vaccine-preventable disease, and other services included in the project as part of universal health coverage and primary health care, contributing to achieving the third Sustainable Development Goal related to good health and well-being.

4. Emergency Support for the Most Vulnerable **Groups**

Malnutrition in Yemen is one of the leading causes of death among children under five, as well as among pregnant and lactating mothers. This health problem has been exacerbated by the collapse of the healthcare system, the challenges of climate change, and other factors.

The Emergency Support Project for the Most Vulnerable Groups, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS and funded by the World Food Program (WFP), was a crucial step toward reducing under-five mortality and increasing survival rates. The project reached more than 98,000 people in 20 targeted districts.

This was achieved through numerous life-saving health and nutrition interventions, including treating malnutrition, distributing nutritional supplements, spreading awareness messages on proper infant nutrition, and providing financial incentives to health workers to enhance their capacity to provide quality care.

5. Sustainable Support and Effective Access to Con flict-Affected Communitiest

Amid increasing rates of malnutrition among children and mothers, the Sustainable Support and Effective Access to Conflict-Affected Communities project in Yemen has been a lifeline for 11,444 people in Al-Misrakh District, Taiz Governorate.

This project, funded by Penney Appeal organization, was implemented by HU-MAN ACCESS, providing healthcare and nutrition services and facilitating access to life-saving preventive and therapeutic nutrition services for children and women most in need and vulnerable.

This is a crucial measure to combat malnutrition among children, pregnant women, and lactating mothers, and to achieve the shared goal of giving everyone the best possible chance for a safe and healthy life.

6. Providing Minimum Health Services for Children and Maternal Healt

In Yemen, women and children-the two most vulnerable groups-pay a heavy price due to the severe shortcomings in health sector services, with many vulnerable to various epidemics and diseases that threaten their health.

To ensure that every woman and child has the best chance of health and survival, HUMAN ACCESS, in partnership with NAS and DWWT organizations, worked to provide minimum health services for children and mothers through Al-Wafa Health Center in Al-Mudhaffar District, Taiz Governorate.

This fruitful partnership has succeeded in reaching more than 88,000 women and children with basic health services, including medical consultations, provision of medicines, family planning services, and awareness-raising about healthy diets and methods for preventing life-threatening malnutrition.

7. Marib Community College Medical Clinic Operation **Project**

Marib Governorate has the largest concentration of displaced people in Yemen, most of whom live in difficult humanitarian conditions and are exposed to extreme heat and the spread of climate-sensitive diseases, making them increasingly in need of healthcare.

Recognizing the urgent need to address the needs of displaced communities, HUMAN ACCESS, in partnership with IHH organization, operated the medical clinic at the community college to serve residents of Al-Rawdah camp for IDPs and address the under-functioning of health facilities.

With more than 23,000 displaced people-mostly women and children at risk—accessing free, high-quality basic healthcare services, the project's goal of improving the health of vulnerable populations amid a protracted humanitarian crisis was achieved.

8. Refugee Health Project in Aden and Lahj

The refugee health project is an example of the successful partnership between HUMAN ACCESS and UNHCR to support refugees hosted by Yemen, who suffer from extreme deprivation and limited access to healthcare.

During 2024, through this vital project implemented in Al-Basateen area and Kharaz camp in Aden and Lahi governorates, more than 193,000 people, both refugees and the host community, gained access to basic healthcare.

The refugee health project offered a variety of services, including life-saving nutritional and therapeutic interventions, a package of quality reproductive health services, mental health support as a universal human right, and other services that played a vital role in saving lives and mitigating the suffering of refugees during these difficult times.

9. Orphan Healthcare Projects

Thanks to the contributions of several donor agencies and institutions, 11,674 male and female orphans received essential medical services during 2024, including comprehensive medical examinations, basic hygiene kits, and surgical procedures. This affirms a firm commitment to serving orphans and providing everything that alleviates their suffering and pain.

10. Health and Pharmaceutical Support

In line with its strategic plan for 2024-2026, HUMAN ACCESS seeks to extend a helping hand to all those in need of treatment and care, alleviating the suffering of patients, especially the vulnerable, including people with disabilities and the elderly.

Through close work with a range of partners, 2024 saw remarkable achievements, with more than 5,000 people receiving essential, free health and pharmaceutical support to maintain their health and lives.

This included operating health facilities and offering specialized healthcare services to cancer patients, kidney failure patients, and children with cerebral palsy, given their dire need for special care and continuous support on their journey to recovery.

Support extended to supplying wheelchairs to people with special needs, organizing medical caravans, and performing surgeries, among other important operations that provide new lives for beneficiaries, saving the lives of many patients, and helping them relieve their pain.

Luck smiles on Ahmed at eight months old

Umm Ahmed did not expect her infant to live long. As she describes him, he is "weak in movement, suffers from illnesses and severe weakness, and loses weight with the passing days," at a time when malnutrition is taking a heavy toll on children in particular.

The mother watched her son's condition with grief and pain, and she could only be patient due to her lack of resources. The family of five was displaced by the conflict to Taiz Governorate, and their displacement had devastating economic consequences.

Umm Ahmed describes her situation by saying, "My husband works for a daily wage, and work is poor, and food prices are extremely high. Sometimes we can't find anything to eat." This situation has pushed the child into the clutches of malnutrition, and the family is unable to treat him due to the difficult circumstances

imposed by the ongoing crisis in Yemen.

Ahmed's life was at stake. Malnutrition is a life-threatening condition. However, a thread of life extended to him at eight months old through the Integrated Sustainable Strengthening of Nutrition and Maternal and Child Health Services project, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS, with the support of Doctors Worldwide organization, through Al-Wafa Health Center in Taiz.

Ahmed's mother says, "A woman advised me to go to the center, and after examinations, it became clear that Ahmed was suffering from severe malnutrition. At the center, they provided him with health and nutrition services, and I was taught about proper nutrition methods and techniques. Within months, he recovered, and his weight is now normal. He is laughing and playing again. I am very happy. You saved my son's life."

A water network ends suffering of 20,000 people in Broom Mayfa'a District

"A long-awaited moment, an indescribable joy," said the residents of Mayfa'a Al-Sufal area in the Broom Mayfa'a District, Hadhramaut Governorate, as they watched life flow with every drop of water through the water network.

Approximately 20,000 people—residents of the region—were suffering from a severe water crisis due to the deterioration of the water network. Water scarcity affects the health and well-being of everyone, especially women and children, who are the primary water collectors.

Because HUMAN ACCESS works to quench the thirst of the most vulnerable populations, it rehabilitated the network based on a field needs study approved by the Water Corporation, in partnership with the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF), as part of its

integrated response support.

In August 2024, in the presence of officials and the public, the project was inaugurated. It received praise from the local authorities, represented by the Secretary-General of the Hadhramaut Local Council, Saleh Al-Umogi, who described the project as important and strategic.

He said it effectively contributes to meeting the growing need for clean water in vulnerable communities. This is also attested to by the residents of the region, who have been freed from the long ordeal of collecting water and now feel relieved. Among them, Khaled Abdullah, said, "You have restored a lifeline for us."



1. Water Projects

Achieving Sustainable Development Goal 6, which guarantees access to water and sanitation for all, requires finding solutions to water problems and improving the quality of water services. This is what HUMAN ACCESS is doing in Yemen, one of the most water-poor countries and the most water-scarce Arab country, not to mention the damage caused by the ongoing conflict and climate change.

With support from OCHA, Sheikh Abdullah Al-Nouri Charitable Society, and Muslim Care, more than 139,000 people benefited from water projects implemented in 2024. These projects included drilling wells and rehabilitating water networks as sustainable solutions to enhance water resources and address the lack of clean water for the population.

The water projects also involved awareness-raising and education, and training volunteers, both male and female, to help reduce water and sanitation-related diseases and contribute to access to clean and safe water sources.

2. Water Supply

In light of the worsening water crisis in Yemen, resulting from climate change and environmental degradation, there is an urgent need for water supply projects to provide safe and clean water to communities in deprived and highly vulnerable areas.

Efforts led by HUMAN ACCESS in 2024, in partnership with OCHA, resulted in more than 79,000 people accessing safe drinking water, improving the quality of life in targeted areas, alleviating the financial burden on families, and mitigating the health risks associated with contaminated water.

More than 42,000 people benefited from chlorine tablets, an effective means of eliminating germs in water, helping to conserve water during storage and use, and making it safe for drinking, food preparation, and personal hygiene.

3. Environmental Sanitation

To address the urgent need to expand basic sanitation services in Yemen, HU-MAN ACCESS implemented the Integrated Response Support Project to Improve Basic Services for the Most Vulnerable Communities, funded by OCHA.

The project benefited more than 120,000 people in 2024 and addressed critical needs of beneficiaries in four governorates, including the rehabilitation of sanitation systems and the construction of bathrooms in IDP settlements suffering from an ongoing sanitation crisis, in addition to the distribution of hygiene kits.

This helped protect public health, reduce the spread of diseases and epidemics, support social stability, and restore a sense of dignity and security, and restore hope to those affected by the ongoing humanitarian crisis, which is the worst in terms of the number of people affected.

In addition to the Integrated Response Support Project, another environmental sanitation project was implemented, involving the digging of a cesspool for Al-Tawbah Mosque in Marib Governorate, with support from a philanthropist, as part of effective sanitation and hygiene solutions.

"Shi'b Al-Haddadin" **Gains New Life with Environmental Project**

A model for sustainable sanitation solutions and a crucial step toward reducing the environmental and health risks caused by open toilets and the lack of sanitation services.

This is the sewage extension project in "Shi'b Al-Haddadin" neighborhood of Al-Mudhaffar District in Taiz Governorate. The project connected the area to the main sewage network, serving approximately 6,000 people who previously suffered from the spread of numerous diseases and epidemics linked to the lack of sanitation services. Now, they enjoy a clean and safe environment.

The residents of Shi'b Al-Haddadin neighborhood expressed their great happiness with this humanitarian intervention, saying that the project gave them security and hope, created a new life for

them, and even contributed to solving many of their sufferings and problems.

Ali Qaed, a resident of the area, said, "You have made a qualitative shift in our lives. The lack of sanitation was one of the forms of suffering we endure." Meanwhile, the local authority in Al-Mudhaffar District, through the district's director general, Mohammed Al-Kadahi, stated, "This project is one of the best implemented in this area in 2024." The authority extended its sincere thanks to HUMAN ACCESS and Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF) for executing this vital project to improve basic services for the most vulnerable communities.

Child Protection from Early Marriage Risk

Many factors push some parents to marry off their daughters early, including economic factors. Families cannot feed many people, and they believe that marrying off girls at puberty is a way to reduce household expenses.

This is the story of T.A., a 14-year-old displaced girl in Marib Governorate. Due to the family's difficult living conditions, her father agreed to marry her to a man 15 years her senior. The rate of underage marriage often rises in humanitarian crises, and it is a form of gender-based violence.

The news of the marriage came as a shock to the girl, as T.A. says: "I was shocked. I couldn't sleep. I don't want to enter the world of motherhood at this age. I want to complete my education. I want to achieve my ambitions. May God help me."

Thus, anxiety and fear gripped the girl, and she almost fell victim to early marriage, which is widespread in Yemen. However, luck was on T.A.'s side, thanks to the Safe Space for Women and Girls, run by HUMAN ACCESS association, in partnership with the United

Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), as part of the Protection and Livelihoods Support Project.

The space implemented a series of interventions to protect this girl, most notably visiting the girl's father and convincing him not to marry her off at this age, given the health, social, and psychological risks associated with early marriage. The mission was successful.

In addition to providing psychological and legal support, T.A. was rehabilitated and economically empowered in the field of mobile phone maintenance and programming to meet her family's needs, as well as to meet the women's community's need to protect their data and privacy on mobile phones.

Regarding these services that support women and girls, T.A. says, "They saved me from imminent danger and protected my childhood. I was able to continue my education and support my family. I regained my self-confidence and understood many of my rights. I am deeply grateful."



1. Safe Spaces and Psychological Support

Protecting vulnerable populations in Yemen is a core component of HUMAN ACCESS interventions, especially women and children, as they are among the most vulnerable and particularly exposed to increased risks amid one of the world's worst protracted humanitarian crises.

UNFPA support has enabled us to provide protection services to more than 100,000 people, most of whom are women and children. Key among these services are the provision of safe spaces to assist women and girls, protecting them from gender-based violence, and providing them with the privacy they need, as well as legal support and vocational training, giving them the opportunity to realize their dreams and build a better future.

With the prevalence of psychological disorders due to ongoing conflict, displacement, economic hardship, and the scarcity of mental health services, interventions in 2024 focused on psychosocial support, trauma treatment, and recreational activities, as part of a series of positive measures to mitigate risks and enhance the resilience and well-being of vulnerable communities.

2. Life-saving Protection Services for Displaced Persons

HUMAN ACCESS mobilizes its efforts to protect displaced persons, who are experiencing harsh living conditions and deteriorating circumstances amidst a complex web of vulnerabilities among the population, in a country still experiencing a recurring displacement crisis.

In a fruitful partnership with UNFPA, more than 218,000 displaced persons received protection services during 2024. These services are critical due to their life-saving nature, especially as the humanitarian crisis worsens, access to basic services declines, and livelihoods deteriorate.

These life-saving protection services involved capacity building, skills training, provision of dignity kits, cash assistance to enable the most vulnerable displaced persons to meet their basic needs, awareness-raising and education, and other services that provided a lifeline for these displaced beneficiaries and protected them from severe risks.

3. Shelter Services

As a leading organization in the field of shelter and non-food items, HUMAN ACCESS works to provide shelter assistance and rehabilitate war-damaged homes to improve the lives of the most vulnerable and impoverished in Yemen.

Shelter services were provided during 2024 with support from Sheikh Abdullah Al-Nouri Charitable Society, the Humanitarian Relief Foundation, and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

These essential services address basic needs, provide beneficiaries with an opportunity to rebuild their lives, and enhance their sense of stability, security, and dignity. They also play a fundamental role in strengthening community resilience in the face of one of the most complex humanitarian crises.

4. Non-Food Items

Given the harsh conditions imposed by the ongoing crisis in Yemen, non-food aid is a cornerstone of support for families severely affected by the ongoing conflict, particularly those suffering from displacement and loss of livelihoods.

In 2024, HUMAN ACCESS succeeded in delivering non-food items (NFIs) to more than 39,000 people in eight governorates. This large number of beneficiaries reflects the significant efforts made to help those affected rebuild their lives and enhance their sense of psychological and social stability.

The NFIs distributed, funded by donors, were not limited to providing kitchen utensils, mattresses, and blankets, but also included distributing toys to children deprived of play due to displacement. This goal is to support their right to play and bring a smile to their faces amid their harsh living conditions.

5. Eid and Winter Clothing

Amid the difficult economic and living conditions that burden Yemenis, many Yemeni families are unable to purchase Eid clothing for their children to enable them to celebrate Eid with dignity and joy, like their peers. They are also unable to purchase winter clothing to protect them from the dangers of the cold.

If aid and assistance are not extended to these needy families across Yemen, children will live in sadness and pain during the holidays, and families will be forced to endure the harsh cold throughout the winter with no other option.

Recognizing these needs, HUMAN ACCESS offered Eid and winter clothing to more than 13,000 people in seven governorates, with support from partners and donors, to bring joy and happiness to children during Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha, and to keep the vulnerable warm during the winter.

Rehabilitating Damaged Homes: A Dream Comes True

In Yemen, some homes have been completely destroyed, while others have sustained some form of damage due to the devastating conflict. This includes the home of Ahmed Ali, 38, in the Harib district of Marib Governorate. It has been transformed into an uninhabitable home, with no doors or windows, and cracked walls bemoaning the ravages of time.

Describing his ordeal, Ahmed said, "Because of the war, my home was damaged, and due to my difficult circumstances, I was unable to repair it. My five children and I were forced to live in one room after blocking its windows with available tools. Our lives are difficult, with no privacy, and we are exposed to danger. We are forced to do so because the repairs require large sums of money beyond my means."

The situation of Ahmed, and many others like him throughout Yemen, calls for the construction and rehabilitation of conflict-damaged homes as a necessary component of the recovery and growth approach, which contributes to achieving sustainable development for all.

For this reason, the rehabilitation program for war-damaged homes, part of the integrated, three-cluster project implemented by HUMAN ACCESS, funded by UNHCR, aims to improve the quality of life for those affected. 100 families in Harib District benefited from this program during 2024.

Without this critical support, these families will be unable to rehabilitate their damaged homes, given the dire living and humanitarian conditions. Ahmed confirms this, saying, "We barely make ends meet, and construction tools are very expensive. I can't even afford a single window given the harsh conditions in the country."

This is why Ahmed's feelings after his home's rehabilitation were indescribable. He said, "It was like a dream. I couldn't believe my eyes when I saw my home in this new, beautiful shape. My joyfulness was as great as the universe. My family and I felt dignity, stability, and security. Thank you is not enough."

This is how Sameh's family became happier and more resilient

Sameh Ahmed, 32, from Taiz Governorate, was involved in a traffic accident as a child, leaving him permanently disabled. This was the first shock of his life, and he soon received another shock with the death of his father.

Sameh says, "My mother was forced to work in handicrafts, and over the years, the burdens doubled. I got married with three children, my mother was diagnosed with thyroid cancer, and my sister became a widow and returned home with her child who suffered from hyperthyroidism."

The war brought a new tragedy to the family when a shell fell on their home in the Sala district, forcing them to move to a rented apartment. Sameh doesn't want to reach out to people, and creative minds know no bounds for disability. That's why he thought of starting a small project in the neighborhood where he lives.

Here, Sameh says, "I decided that the most suitable profession for me, given my disability, was working in a grocery store. By

borrowing and selling my savings, I rented a store and started working. However, the income was low, business activity was weak due to the war, and the obligations were high. The store was on the verge of bankruptcy."

Because HUMAN ACCESS works to empower the economically vulnerable, it intervened at the right time. With funding from IHH, the grocery store was supplied with a quantity of merchandise, the storefront and signage were renovated, and some assets were offered, including a refrigerator and a solar energy system to provide a source of energy and contribute to environmental protection by reducing carbon emissions.

Commenting on the significant economic empowerment, Sameh said, "The store has recovered significantly. You have saved my livelihood and that of my family. I can't imagine what our lives would be like if the grocery store collapsed. I live happily now and I am striving to expand the scope of the business."



1. Income-Generating Projects

Providing income-generating projects for vulnerable people is a key area of HUMAN ACCESS and a priority within its strategic plan for 2024-2026. This aims to improve the living conditions of families and the most vulnerable groups and enable them to become economically self-sufficient amid the difficult conditions facing Yemen.

Thanks to the support of partners and donors, 408 people benefited from income-generating projects in 2024, including livestock and beekeeping. These projects are vital for ensuring livelihoods and income in rural and peri-urban areas, helping achieve self-sufficiency and address the impacts of a changing climate.

Among the projects executed are fishing boats, fruit and vegetable shops, and other small businesses that contribute to local economies and sustain livelihoods, particularly among the working poor and youth. They also help achieve the first Sustainable Development Goal of eradicating poverty.

2. Providing Livelihood Services for Women and Girls

The living burdens resulting from the conflict in Yemen are taking their toll on women. HUMAN ACCESS strives to rehabilitate affected women and girls, preparing them to establish purposeful, self-employed businesses based on highly professional foundations, and creating the appropriate conditions and resources to leverage their capabilities.

Over the course of a full year, with UNFPA support, approximately 34,000 women in seven governorates benefited from a variety of services, including the acquisition of various life skills to enhance their self-confidence, vocational and craft training to create good job opportunities, and the organization of bazaars to showcase the products of the beneficiaries and provide marketing opportunities for their products.

This has helped expand the scope of economic opportunities available to women, strengthen their role in comprehensive development, and support the livelihoods and well-being of affected communities. Women beneficiaries have transformed into productive families capable of facing the challenges and deteriorating living conditions in the country due to a decade of ongoing crisis.

3. Productive Families for Orphans Project

As part of its efforts to transform the lives of orphans and create sustainable employment opportunities for them, HUMAN ACCESS trains, supports, and economically empowers families supporting orphans, providing them with the necessary resources and capabilities to launch their own businesses.

During 2024, with funding from the International Islamic Charity Organization (IICO) and the Humanitarian Relief Foundation (IHH), 1,355 orphans received livelihood and economic empowerment grants in various fields that meet their needs.

This includes sewing and embroidery, hairdressing and beauty, animal husbandry, and mobile phone maintenance. The goal is to provide a sustainable source of development that ensures a decent life for orphans, increases their ability to cope with the economic consequences of losing their breadwinner, and makes a significant impact on their lives.

4. Refugee Integration Project

Despite the ongoing conflict and deteriorating conditions in Yemen, the migration route from the Horn of Africa to Yemen remains one of the busiest and most dynamic in the world.

Thousands of refugees, mostly from Ethiopia and Somalia, have settled in Yemen and are living in dire conditions due to harsh living conditions and an uncertain future. Some have resorted to begging to survive.

Hence, the importance of the Refugee Integration Project, executed by HU-MAN ACCESS, in partnership with UNHCR, is highlighted. This project aims to improve economic opportunities for refugees and asylum seekers in Kharaz camp in Lahj Governorate and respond to their growing needs.

The project provided refugees with vocational and technical training in vital crafts, such as straw production, in addition to providing them with comprehensive grants that enable them to establish their own businesses. These initiatives have contributed to 74 refugees entering the labor market and earning a living.

Educational Sponsorship Unleashes Amina's Ambitions

Student Amina Ugbah, who studies at Khadija School in Taiz Governorate, dreams of becoming a doctor, engineer, or archaeologist. However, being an orphan became a rock in the road to her dream, nearly limiting her ability to attend school.

Orphans are among the groups most at risk of dropping out of school, which calls for action to save them from ignorance and safeguard their future, and that of Yemen in general. They are an important segment of society, and education is the backbone of any country's development.

Amina speaks of her dreams, saying, "Every day, my dreams grow with me, and education is the only way to achieve my ambitions. So be by my side." To prevent her beautiful dream, and those like hers, the Educational Sponsorship Project for Orphans in Yemen was launched. This project was launched by HUMAN ACCESS, in collaboration with the International Islamic Charity Organization

(IICO), in several Yemen's governorates, as part of ongoing efforts to serve orphans, according to quality standards and a unified global care charter.

The project enabled Amina to advance in her academic journey, achieving excellence in the seventh grade. She benefited from multiple services, such as the provision of school supplies and educational programs aimed at raising her cognitive, cultural, and moral standards.

This was reflected in Amina's active participation in school activities, according to her teachers at school. It also contributed to her sound upbringing, as confirmed by her mother, Naseeba Amin, who thanked the Orphan Education Sponsorship Project, saying, "It provided me with the best service. It enabled my daughter to pursue her education and helped me raise her according to ethical principles."



1. Supporting and Rehabilitating the Educational Infrastructure

To achieve Sustainable Development Goal 4, which focuses on promoting quality and inclusive education, HUMAN ACCESS plays a critical role in addressing the education crisis in Yemen and providing a brighter future for children.

Among the most prominent projects implemented, funded by partners and donors, to improve the educational environment and infrastructure, is the equipping of classrooms with the latest specifications and the supply of school chairs for schools in displacement camps in Marib. This is due to the pivotal role education plays in providing stability and a sense of normalcy for children during times of crisis and displacement.

A number of projects were executed during 2024, including the supply of a solar energy system for the Happy Child School in Wadi Hadhramaut, to create a suitable learning environment for students. This is also part of the investment in clean energy sources to achieve Sustainable Development Goal 7, which is related to ensuring access to clean energy.

2. School Bag and Uniform Project

A total number of 3150 children were able to continue their education during 2024, thanks to the School Bag and Uniform Project, initiated by HUMAN AC-CESS, with support from partners and donors.

The project involved the delivery of school bags containing essential supplies. in addition to school uniforms, to support orphaned students in Yemen and refugees in the Republic of Djibouti, encourage them to return to school, and reduce the phenomenon of children dropping out of education.

Among the project's goals is to alleviate the financial burden associated with education on vulnerable families. Economic hardships cast a long shadow over Yemenis, and the obstacles to education are significant, leaving children vulnerable to numerous challenges. As a result, the School Bag and Uniform Project was widely welcomed.

3. Supporting Refugee Access to Education

The Integrated Refugee Project reflects the significant efforts made by HU-MAN ACCESS, in partnership with UNHCR, to shape a better and sustainable future for refugees and asylum seekers in Yemen and enable them to realize their aspirations and true potential.

This humanitarian project's services are diverse and extend to the field of education. During 2024, it benefited 5,528 refugees, both male and female, in Kharaz camp in Lahj Governorate, by providing them with basic school supplies, along with awareness-raising and educational support.

These services are critical to facilitating refugees' access to education, a right and a condition of life. Without these services, these vulnerable refugee children will face enormous challenges on their journey to school, given the difficult economic challenges and the resulting serious threat to their present and future.

4. Educational Sponsorships for Orphans

Educational sponsorships provide a real opportunity for orphans in Yemen to continue their education, contribute to preparing them for the future in the best possible way, and compensate for some of the losses they have suffered due to the loss of their breadwinner.

The efforts led by HUMAN ACCESS, in cooperation with partners, resulted in 4,537 orphans in the governorates of Hadhramaut, Taiz, Marib, Hodeida, and lbb receiving educational sponsorships and financial aid to support and enable them to enroll in basic and university education.

As a result, these orphan beneficiaries pursued their educational journey during 2024, achieving their dreams and becoming positive members of Yemen's society. This is a very significant achievement, especially since ensuring access to education for this vulnerable group is a prerequisite for recovery, peace, and social cohesion.

These activities contributed to a positive impact on the lives of the beneficiary youth, enhancing their skills, capabilities, and knowledge, and writing a new chapter for them filled with hope, progress, and the promise of a better tomorrow.
