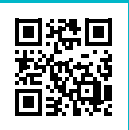

Establishment

Human Access for Partnership and Development (HUMAN ACCESS) was established on March 19, 1990, by an elite group of volunteers and social figures, as a non-governmental charitable organization that aims to implement its projects and programs and provide its services and activities according to periodic and renewed strategic plans, and thoughtful, methodical work, to form a link and a linking chain between the donor and the beneficiary..

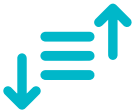




Priorities

Through the 2025 Strategy, Human Access identified its priorities for the next phase based on lengthy discussions that took several months. The association then reached the necessity and importance of focusing on sustainable development as a priority that precedes attention to immediate relief and care, considering that sustainable development is the cornerstone and the greatest factor in achieving progress and comprehensive societal advancement. It also focused on women, children, and youth, as these three groups are among the most important pillars of the advanced and desired society, making it necessary and important.

Furthermore, the strategy emphasized rural development to address the shortcomings that occur in the countryside, which lacks a number of services that are mostly implemented in urban areas, despite the fact that a large portion of the population lives in rural areas and suffers extreme poverty in various development sectors.



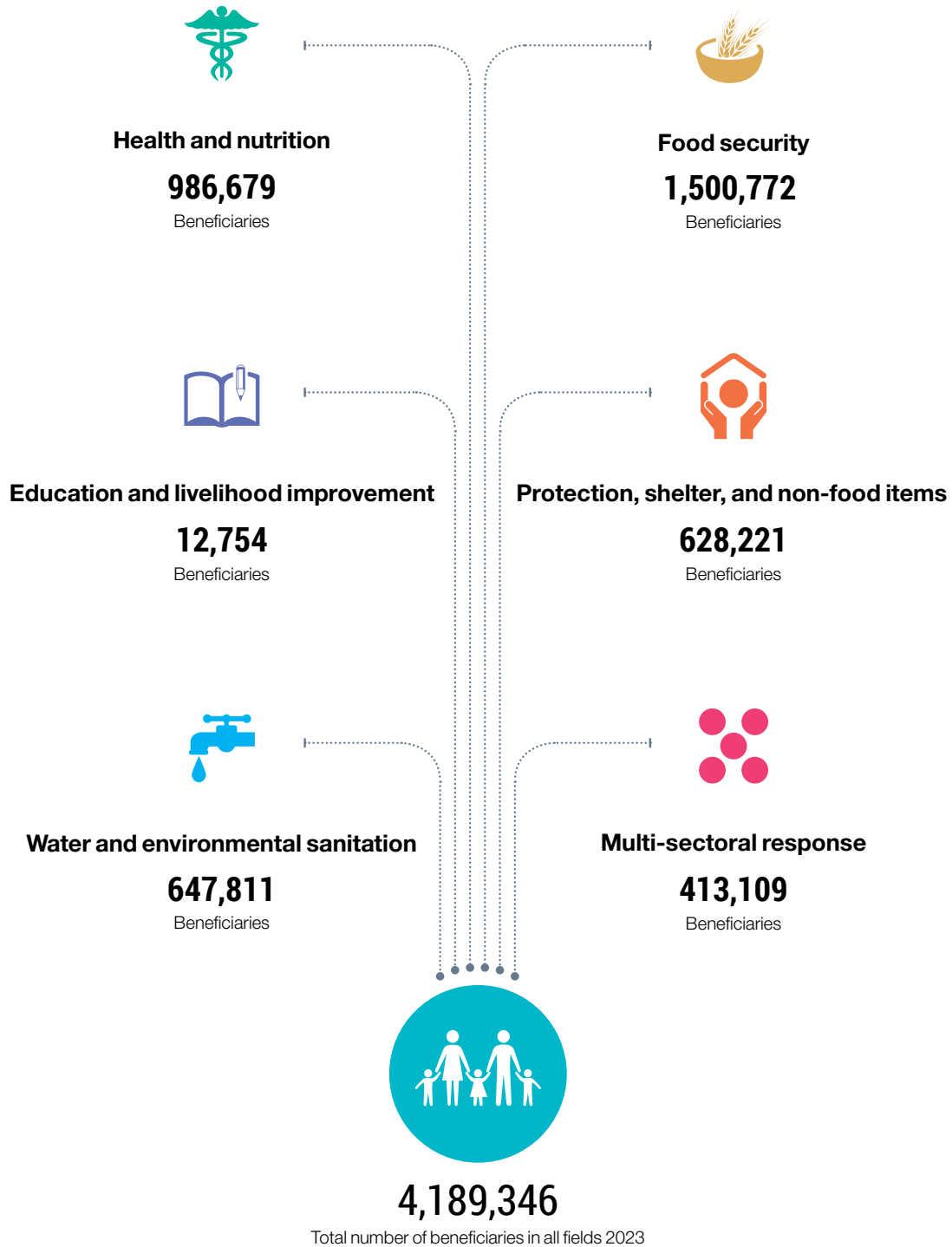
Scope of Work

1. Relief and nutritional care

Human Access has extended a relief lifeline to families affected by the crisis in Yemen to increase the availability of and safe access to food. It has also made a noticeable impact on people's lives, in light of deteriorating living conditions that have placed large segments of society below the poverty line.

With a number of donor organizations, this year the association distributed food baskets, ready-made meals, and bread bags. This food support has made a huge difference in the living conditions of more than eighty-two thousand people who are in dire need of humanitarian assistance, to alleviate their suffering and prevent further deterioration in needs.

2. GFA food aid project

With Yemen still facing multiple challenges, Human Access' extended partnership with the World Food Program is critical for addressing food insecurity.

The GFA food aid project reflects a joint commitment to respond to humanitarian needs and secure the livelihood of the vulnerable, a project whose goodness extended this year to about four hundred and sixty thousand needy people in the governorates of Taiz and Lahj. The project's services were not limited to distributing food baskets, but also extended to cash assistance to enable the vulnerable to meet their necessary requirements. Therefore, it is crucial to break the cycle of hunger and prevent further deterioration.



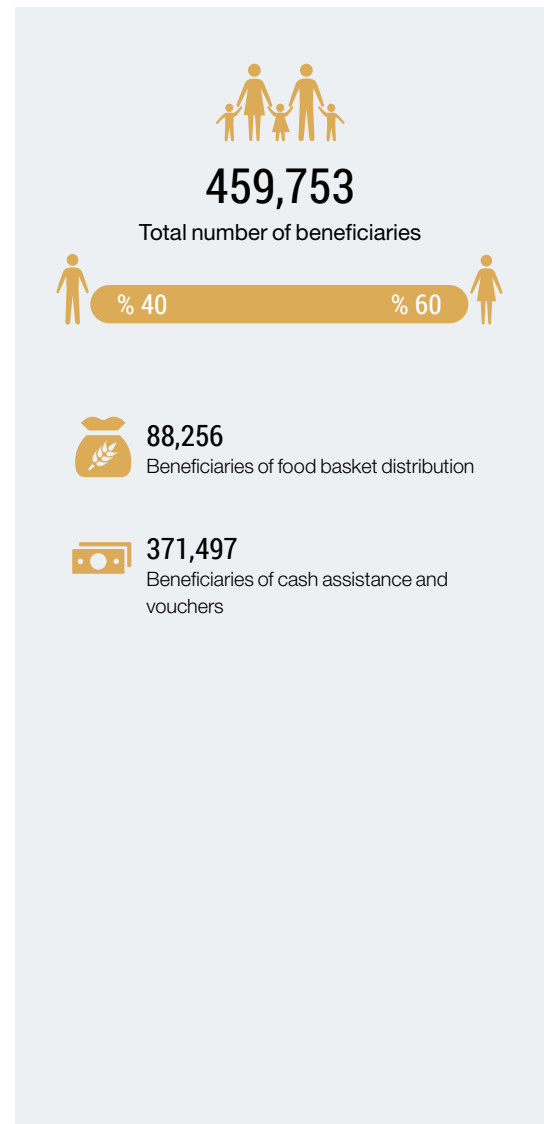

3. Ramadan food projects

Human Access has been implementing Ramadan charity projects every year across Yemen. In collaboration with many partners and donors, the objective of this ongoing humanitarian initiative is to stand with those in need and affected, assist them in fulfilling their fasting obligations, and ease the heavy burdens caused by the conflict on Yemenis.

The Ramadan food projects for 2023 included the distribution of food baskets that contained basic food items, as well as the distribution of iftar meals for fasting people, dates, meat, and vegetables, which resulted in the happiness of four hundred and seventy thousand male and female beneficiaries during the holy month.

4. Sacrificial meat distribution projects

Happiness multiplies with the implementation of humanitarian projects aimed at spreading joy in souls through giving and goodness. A number of organizations and donors throughout Yemen participate in Human Access' Eid al-Adha service in order to bring a smile to the faces of the poor and needy by distributing sacrificial meat, which is difficult to obtain for most in Yemen.

More than four hundred and eighty-four thousand individuals had a different taste and flavor because they were able to eat meat. This support is crucial to bring joy to the hearts of children and families deprived of eating meat and to provide the opportunity for donors and philanthropists to share the joy of Eid with those in need and the disadvantaged.

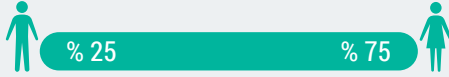

1. Emergency support for the most vulnerable groups with therapeutic and preventive nutrition services

Malnutrition poses a constant threat to children, pregnant women, and breastfeeding mothers in Yemen. It causes preventable deaths and negatively affects the development and mental abilities of children, especially children under the age of five who remain the most vulnerable.

As a result, Human Access in partnership with WFP developed therapeutic and preventive nutrition program to under-5-year-old children and pregnant and lactating mothers through an emergency support project.

This year, the project's life-saving services reached 550,438 individuals, distributed over twenty districts, which greatly enhanced the health care scene in three governorates, and was the subject of constant praise, thanks, and gratitude from everyone.

2. Supporting reproductive health services

The availability of life-saving reproductive health services, such as family planning, obstetrics, and newborn care, can help reduce maternal and neonatal mortality, improve family health, and foster community thriving.

These vital services were part of the services of the Reproductive Health Services Support Project, which ensured access of 145,555 individuals from the most vulnerable groups to quality reproductive care services, including medical consultations, awareness, and training of health personnel, especially midwives.

UNFPA funded this project, which was implemented by Human Access this year through seven medical facilities in the districts of (Tarim, Ghayl Bawazir, Mayfa', Al-Qahirah, Al-Misrakh, Al-Ghaydah, Al-Madhariba Wa Ras Al-Arah) in the governorates of Hadhramaut, Taiz, Al-Mahra, and Lahj, as part of comprehensive health coverage and primary healthcare.



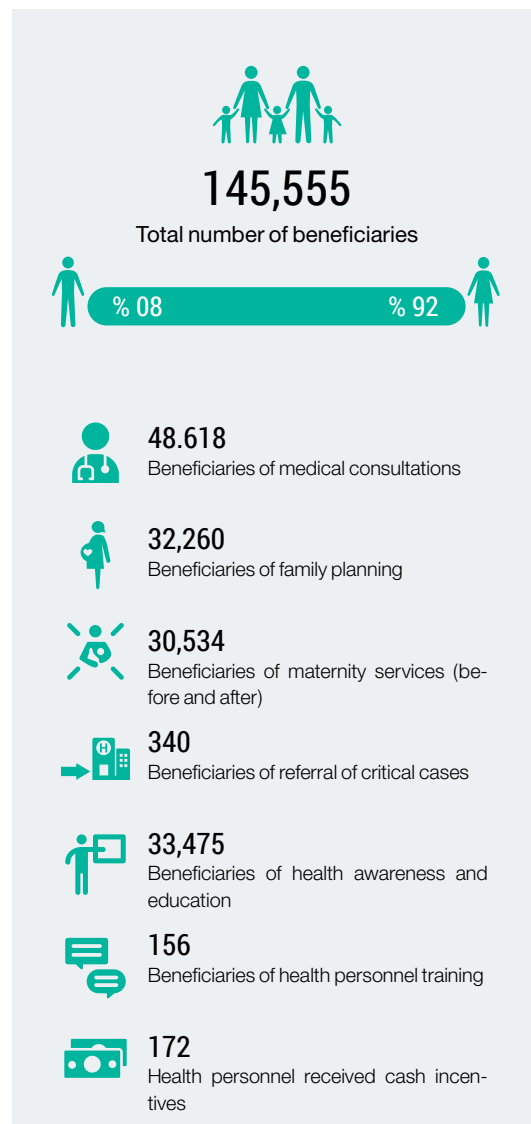

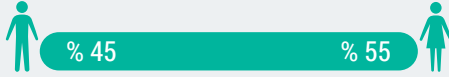

3. Providing basic health care services in life-saving emergencies

Yemen's Marib governorate has the highest number of internally displaced people, raising concerns about the spread of deadly diseases and epidemics, particularly due to overcrowding of displacement camps lacking the most basic necessities to survive in an overburdened health system.

Human Access demonstrated its strong commitment to this vulnerable segment by providing basic, life-saving emergency health care services within the Minimum Service Package (MSP) for displaced people and host communities in Al-Wadi District, Marib.

About sixty-three thousand people received reproductive health services and medicines through the partnership with WHO, critical cases were referred to higher-level healthcare, an emergency caused by Coronavirus was responded to, children were vaccinated against deadly diseases, and other lifesaving services were provided to the displaced and host communities.

4. Emergency health and nutrition response for conflict-affected communities

Human Access stands alongside conflict-affected communities to serve the most vulnerable groups in society through healthcare services, especially in remote rural areas that suffer from difficulty accessing these services. Among these areas are Al-Waziyah and Mawza districts in Taiz Governorate, where the two districts have seen a significant improvement in access to health care thanks to the emergency health and nutrition response to conflict-affected communities.

This response, funded by YHF, had a significant positive impact on the lives of more than ninety thousand beneficiaries. This included essential assistance such as providing free medicines to patients, therapeutic and preventive nutrition for children, cash incentives for health personnel, safe delivery services, and counseling for pregnant and breastfeeding mothers.



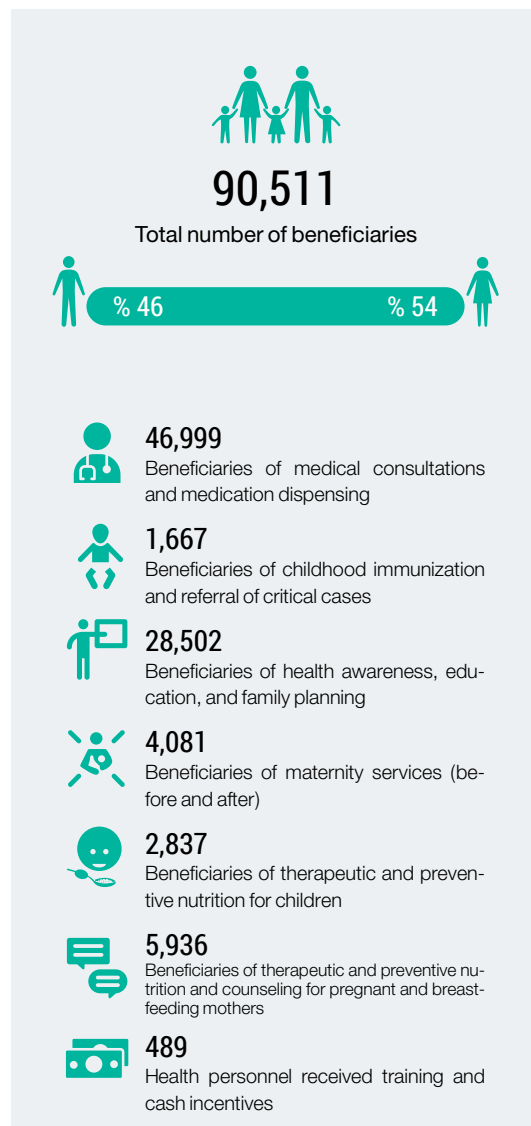

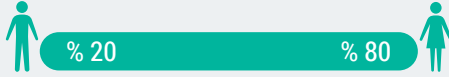

5. Supportive healthcare project to address malnutrition cases

Malnutrition is one of the most horrific life crises resulting from the conflict in Yemen and has become a threat to the lives of many children, especially children under the age of five, as well as pregnant women and breastfeeding mothers. Therefore, more interventions are urgently needed to ensure the health and survival of every woman and child.

Human Access has taken an important step to prevent and treat chronic malnutrition through the healthcare project supporting the treatment of malnutrition cases. This project was funded by Kaaf organization and made a big difference in the lives of 3,943 beneficiaries in Mashra'a Wa Hadnan district of Taiz Governorate, one of the remote areas that are difficult to reach and suffering from a lack of basic health services, especially in cases of malnutrition.

6. Providing a minimum health services for children and mothers in war-affected communities

The harsh conditions suffered by the population in Taiz Governorate highlighted the urgent need to provide the minimum health services to children and mothers in communities affected by the war. A key indicator of Human Access' ability and success is its capability to provide these important services of the highest quality to more than sixty-seven thousand residents of Al-Muzaffar district this year, which is one of the most densely populated districts in the country with a dire health situation.

As a result of the funding from NAS and YYD organizations, a variety of basic services were provided, including therapeutic and preventive nutrition for children under five, maternal and neonatal healthcare, reproductive health services, medical consultations, medicine supply to patients, health education programs, and financial incentives for health workers. For the target population, these health services and activities represented an important source of support.



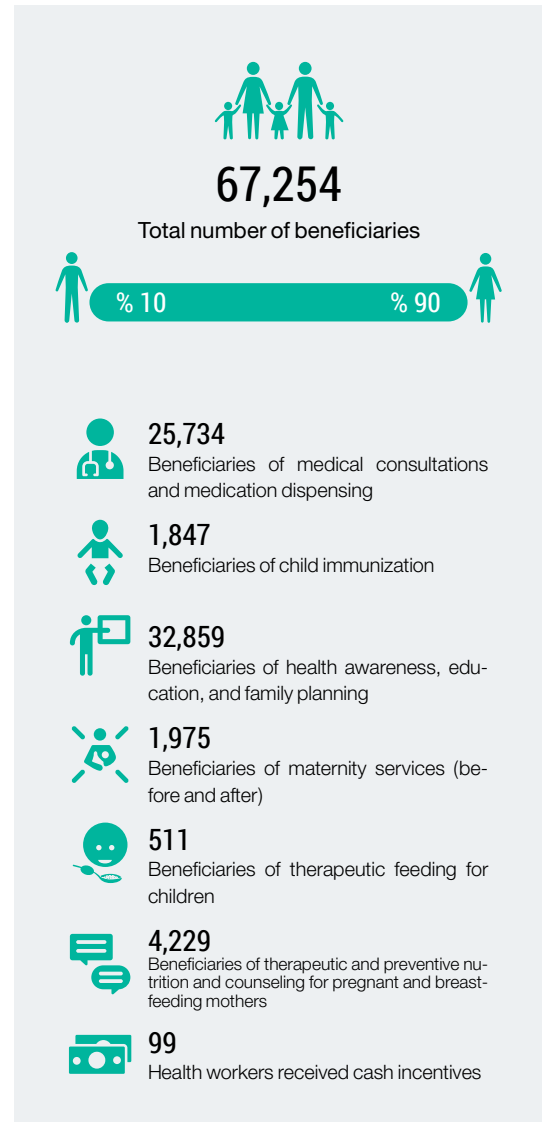

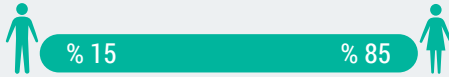

7. Sustainable support and effective access to conflict-affected communities in Yemen

In light of overcrowded health facilities that appear to be beyond capacity, Human Access is dedicated to making a positive and sustainable impact in Yemen's local communities, especially the most vulnerable. This was accomplished through sustained support and effective access to communities affected by the conflict, which benefited more than twenty thousand people in Al-Misrakh District of Taiz Governorate, thanks to the partnership with Penney Appeal organization.

A variety of basic health services and therapeutic nutrition services were provided through the project, including dispensing free medicines, giving advice to mothers regarding infant nutrition, and rewarding healthcare workers with incentives to ensure the sustainability of these services. As a result, the level of medical services has increased in a positive way for patients and has led to an increase in survival rates.

8. Health and medication support

Several Human Access projects provide health and medical support for one goal, which is to build a safer and healthier future for Yemenis. More than forty-five thousand of the most vulnerable groups have relied on it this year for hope of recovery and survival.

Through the collaboration of many partners and donors, the capacity of health institutions has been built to ensure localization and sustainability of medical services, as well as to maintain therapeutic feeding centers, to perform surgical operations, and to operate medical clinics that saved the lives of many patients.

Feeling the responsibility to support people with special needs, wheelchairs were delivered to facilitate their access to services and improve their health condition. In addition, physical therapy services were provided to children with cerebral palsy, and medical oxygen was guaranteed to hospitals, which made health facilities more efficient and effective.



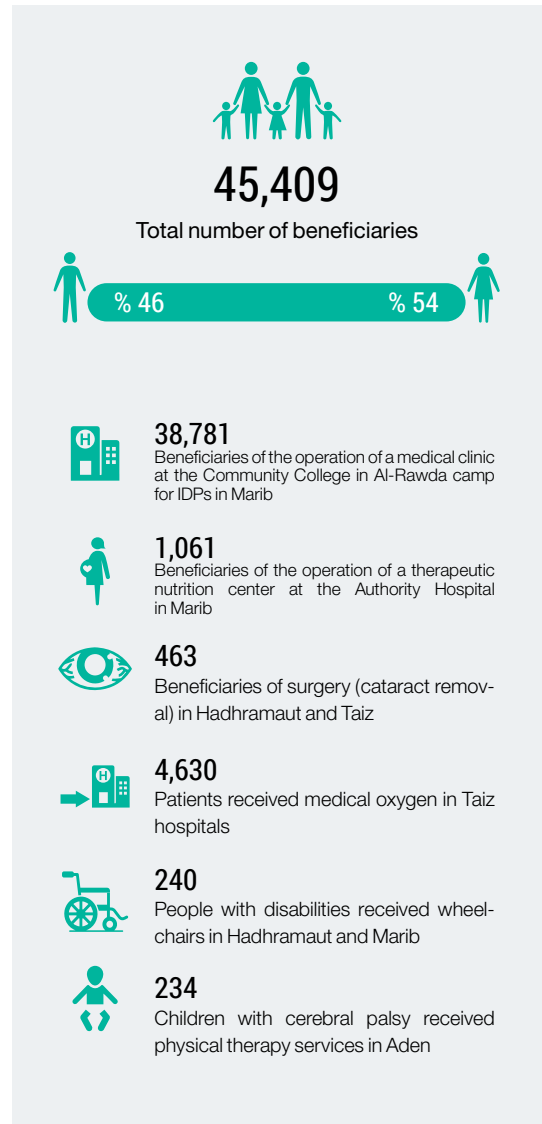

1. Safe spaces and psychological support center

Human Access has a history strengthened in partnership with UNFPA in supporting and protecting women, girls, and children, as they are the most vulnerable groups during conflicts, especially those living in fragile situations. In order to address the gender-based violence problems faced by the most vulnerable women and girls, safe spaces have been created for them specifically in temporary displacement sites.

To facilitate their access to the social, legal and other services they desperately need to protect themselves, child spaces have been created within safe spaces. Moreover, the Psychosocial Support Center at Al-Shihr Hospital in Hadhramaut worked to meet the increasing mental health needs. Through these spaces and the psychological support center, protection services, including gender-based violence prevention services, reached more than one hundred thousand beneficiaries this year. Without these interventions, women, girls and children will bear the unrealistic impact of the Yemeni crisis.



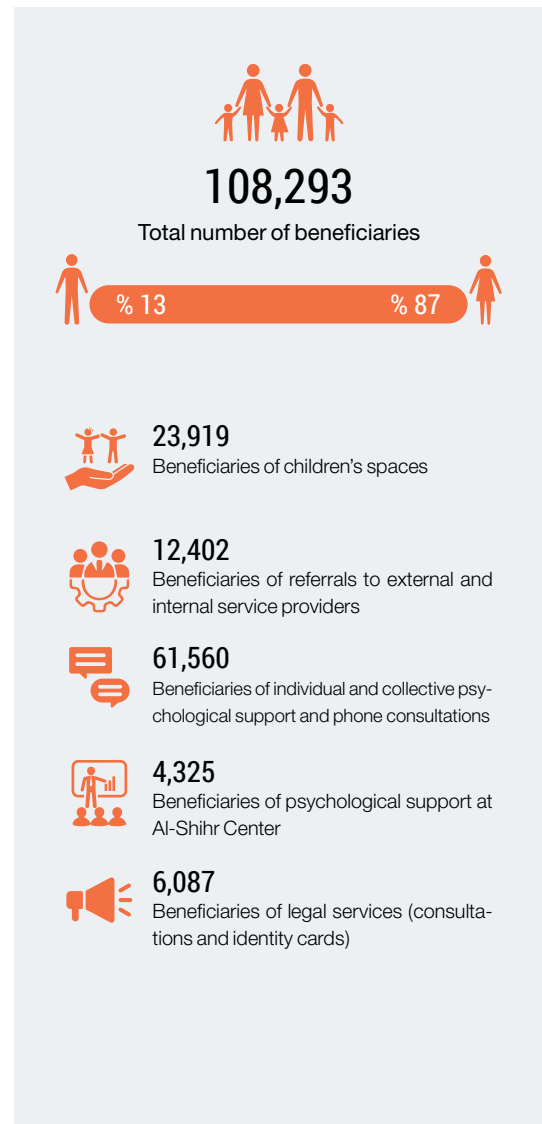

2. Rehabilitation and economic empowerment

A key element of Human Access' commitment to helping the most vulnerable women is not only that it provides humanitarian assistance, but it also provides vocational rehabilitation and income-generating projects to improve their living conditions, as one of the sustainable solutions to daily hardships to enhance their resilience.

With the support provided by UNFPA for Human Access this year, 8,673 women learned professional trades, gained valuable life skills, were able to market their products, and were economically empowered by receiving the requirements needed to practice their profession as a result of the protection and livelihood support project.

There are many success stories of economic projects that provided a safe haven for beneficiaries after they turned into productive, self-reliant families. To preserve women's privacy, women also performed work that had been typically restricted to men, such as the maintenance of mobile phones. All of such initiatives have opened the way for beneficiary families to achieve financial independence and enhance the role of women in economic activities.



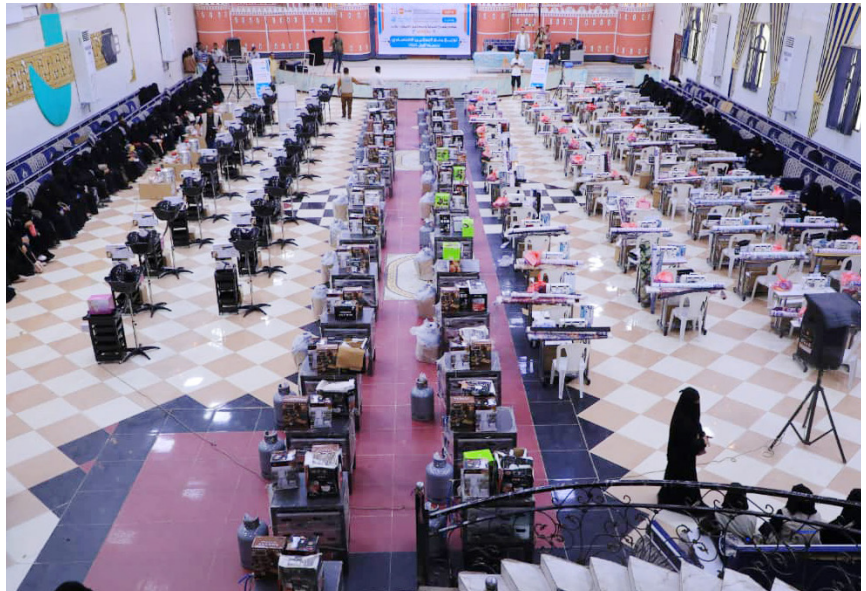

3. Awareness sessions and other responses

Human Access plays a crucial role in raising community awareness in order to stimulate positive social change and protect women's rights without compromising cultural or religious values. The majority of women and girls are ignorant of their rights, and social norms negatively affect women's rights, so bringing awareness to these topics is the first step to changing people's perceptions.

During this year, the association, with funding from UNFPA, implemented awareness-raising, mobilization and advocacy sessions in 6 governorates to erase wrong ideas and outdated traditions, in addition to multiple positive measures taken to enhance women's participation in economic and social activities, benefiting more than one hundred thousand cases. Having made these efforts, a more just and prosperous future will be achieved by promoting and protecting the rights of women and girls.



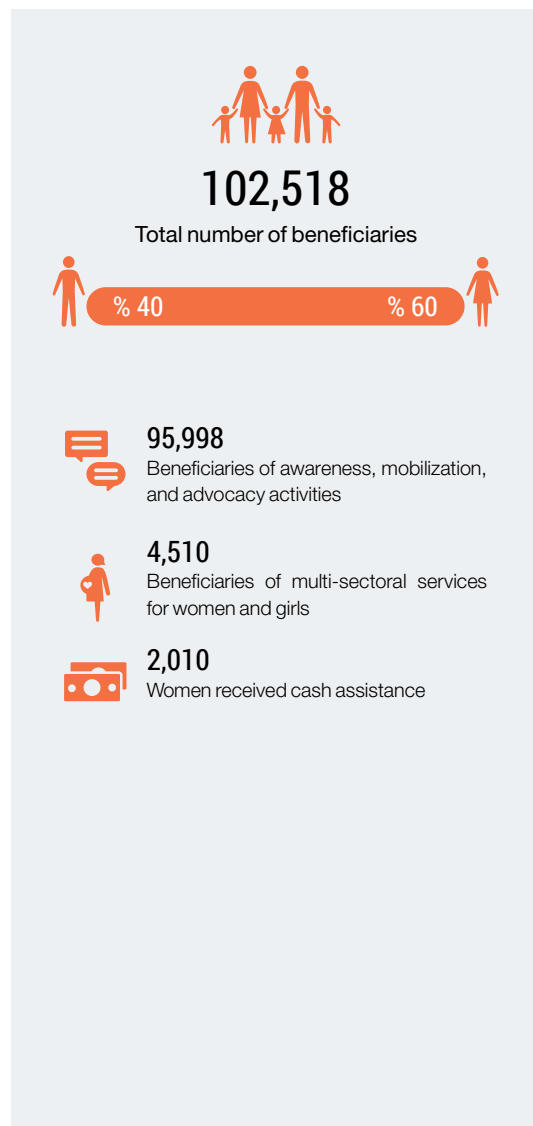

4. Life-saving protection services

Human Access has always worked to protect and support displaced people as part of its mission to save lives, protect rights, and provide a response to people who have been forced to flee their homes due to conflict and are facing grave dangers that threaten their lives.

Marib Governorate is home to a large number of displaced people, and behind every tent in the displacement camps there are urgent and growing needs for people whose livelihoods have been cut off, who are in a very vulnerable situation and do not enjoy protection, and whose survival has become dependent on life-saving protection services.

As a result of extraordinary efforts made by Human Access, funded by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), 297,944 vulnerable displaced persons and host community members in Marib City and Marib Al-Wadi districts received life-saving protection services in 2023.

These services included psychological and legal support, cash assistance, child-friendly spaces, the formation of community protection networks, awareness and education, quick-impact projects, and others, making a difference for the forcibly displaced and host communities, in the midst of the challenges of remaining inside displacement camps and local communities that lack the most basic services.

5. Child protection project

Children in humanitarian settings are particularly vulnerable, and protecting them during emergencies is one of the areas of humanitarian responsibility. Preserving their lives and futures and promoting an environment that provides protection for all children and adolescents at all times is a priority for the humanitarian response.

The needs of children in Yemen are still huge, and they are considered one of the most vulnerable groups of all, as they suffer from limited opportunities to obtain humanitarian assistance, at a time when their protection is most needed.

Through 2023, Human Access helped protect and meet the needs of the most vulnerable children, meeting the essential needs of children and adolescents with the help of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF). As part of a project to provide critical case management support services to children affected by the conflict, this was achieved from January through December 2023, with the objective of providing relief to children and families affected by the conflict in Marib Governorate's City and Wadi districts.

The project made progress with 1,201 individuals receiving psychological support services, birth certificates, medical services, economic empowerment, and family reunification, which helped protect childhood and strengthen the protective environment for accessing child protection services.



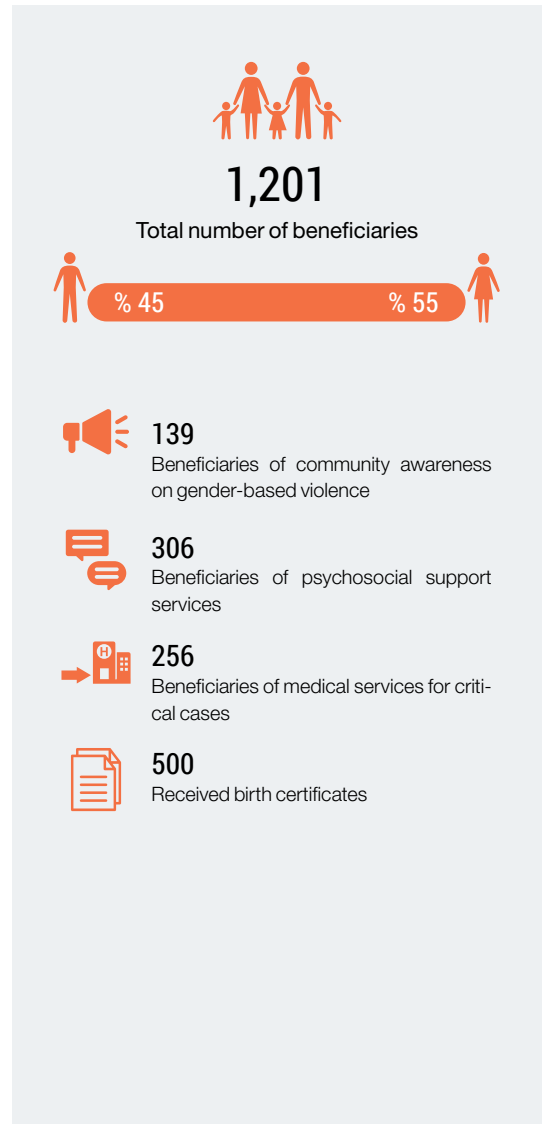

6. Shelter and non-food items

The highest levels of vulnerability are in IDP hosting sites, where few services are available and protection needs remain very high. With good and sustainable humanitarian access, providing shelter materials and meeting their basic needs is the only way to help the displaced overcome their difficult humanitarian situation.

Working with a group of partners, Human Access this year provided various forms of protection to more than seventy thousand displaced men and women in four governorates. This support involved the provision of tents, mattresses, blankets, hygiene bags, personal hygiene supplies, kitchen utensils, and heaters. These are basic necessities for daily life so that the most vulnerable displaced people become more adaptable and able to live in dignity, regain hope mixed with feelings of alienation from their homes, and most importantly, protect them from great risks related to the dangers of severe weather and diseases.

7. Eid and winter clothing

Eid puts a smile on children's faces with its joy, especially buying new clothes and gifts. With the exception of poor children, they reflect sadness on Eid's face and bring pain into their hearts, so no joy is shown and no clothes are bought, leaving them in psychological distress.

That's why, during Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha, Human Access rushes to bring joy to the hearts of children whose families find it difficult to provide them with new clothes. It was very wonderful to see the happiness of the beneficiary children, after receiving Eid clothes and gifts.

In order to ensure the safety of the vulnerable, especially the displaced, Human Access distributes winter clothing annually in torn tents that lack protective materials because the winter season can be very harsh. With the support of partners, tens of thousands of displaced people enjoyed the warmth this year by receiving blankets and winter clothes to protect them from the extreme cold and health risks.

1. Support and rehabilitation of educational infrastructure

Human Access's commitment to advancing education is a top priority even under difficult circumstances. A decline in demand for education is one of the reasons for displacement. In order to increase the chances of displaced children enrolling in education, the association renovated and furnished four schools in Al-Jufinah camp, funded by the International Islamic Charity Organization, to ensure that their studies are not interrupted and that they have comprehensive and safe access to education.

With support from the International Islamic Charity Organization, the Ali Saleh Al-Luhaib College for Vocational and Technical Rehabilitation and Training was built, equipped, and operated at the University of the Saba Region in Marib to provide young people with the professional and life skills needed to find employment opportunities, join the workforce, and earn a living.

The Al-Qadisiyah Institute for Vocational Training project was also implemented in Hadhramaut, with funding from the Sheikh Abdullah Al-Nouri Charity Society.

2. School bag and uniform project

As a way to relieve the burden on poor families and to encourage vulnerable students to continue their education, Human Access provides basic educational necessities, such as school uniforms and school bags with the necessary supplies, which are essential preparations for returning to school and the key to a brighter future for children.

With the support of partners, 6,734 male and female students were able this year to continue their education during this difficult time that the country is going through. These school supplies also represented a real opportunity for these children to continue their education, enabling them to achieve their ambitions and dreams, and ensuring their ability to overcome backwardness and poverty.

3. Livelihood support

Human Access interventions to support the most vulnerable groups are not limited to providing humanitarian aid, but also include creating economic projects that suit the needs of the labor market, enabling affected individuals to earn a living, and giving them the ability to invest in their current environment to become more adaptive and achieve self-reliance.

By providing income-generating projects, such as sheep raising, sewing machines, and fruit and vegetable stores, a decent life was provided for 252 individuals this year. As a result of these small projects, funded by the IHH and MyCARE organizations, beneficiary families have been able to become financially independent, contribute to the economy, and reduce unemployment.

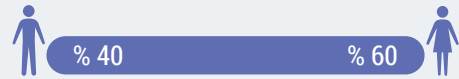

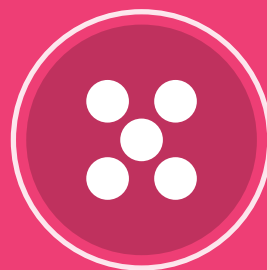

1. Sponsorship and care for orphans

A large part of Human Access' interventions is geared towards orphans, who need and require care and attention, and need to be provided with the necessary means of protection and care in order to ensure their upbringing is in a sound environment so that they feel a sense of cooperation and community solidarity and are prepared for the future in the best possible way.

In the context of ensuring comprehensive care for orphans, the association established a special sector for this category. In this year's initiative, more than eighty-one thousand orphans received health, education, social, and living assistance, thanks to the involvement of several charity people, organizations, and donors.

Training and economic empowerment for orphans' families is also provided, enabling them to operate their own projects to cope with burdens resulting from the loss of the breadwinner.

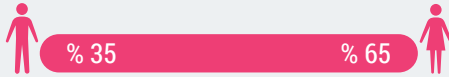

2. Health project for refugees in Aden and Lahj

In 2023, Human Access's health project services reached more than three hundred thousand refugee and host community individuals in Basateen and Kharaz districts of Aden and Lahj governorates. The UNHCR-funded project provides important and targeted services, including primary health care, medical referral services, reproductive health, therapeutic nutrition, awareness and counseling, as an important part of the humanitarian response efforts in Yemen.

Through this project, these refugees, who are most marginalized and vulnerable in the country, have received some form of protection. In addition, they are no longer susceptible to disease spread and endanger everyone's health by not having access to basic healthcare.

3. Integrated response to Yemeni refugees in Djibouti

With the help of partners, Human Access has been able to provide bridges of charity and giving to Yemeni refugees in the Republic of Djibouti, who live in fragile conditions and face additional vulnerabilities in the camps, making it difficult for them to survive the shocks of asylum and live in dignity.

Humanitarian interventions this year to help refugee children continue their education included providing the necessary school supplies to ensure their future, as well as food aid to families, including meat. This support played a major role in alleviating the suffering of more than seventeen thousand people and improving their living conditions, which kept hope alive in their souls and brought joy to their hearts.

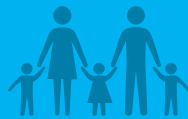

1. Water projects

More than eighteen thousand people no longer face any difficulties in obtaining safe drinking water because HUMAN ACCESS, in partnership with supporters and philanthropists, worked to dig wells in their remote areas to provide sustainable sources of water and secure their needs for drinking water and personal use.

Water projects this year included drilling an artesian well in Dhamar Governorate, with support from the Sheikh Abdullah Al-Nouri Charity Society, as well as rehabilitating and drilling eight wells in the governorates of: (Hodeidah, Hajjah, Al-Mahwit, Dhamar, and Amran), with funding from philanthropists. These projects are crucial since Yemen is the country in the world most in need of water, and getting safe drinking water is an everyday challenge for millions of Yemenis.

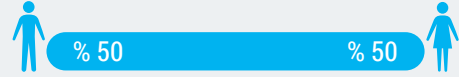

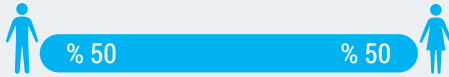

2. Water supply

Providing water is a sign of mercy and generosity. It is one of the Human Access projects to quench thirsty breasts and provide assistance to thirsty souls in the most vulnerable population centers, especially the displaced communities who face real suffering during the arduous daily search to fetch water.

During the crisis, the cost of water trucks increased exponentially, so the project included water truck distribution. The supply of water trucks comes to ensure access to safe drinking water and alleviate the suffering of women and children who bear the brunt of the water crisis.

Relying on the support of partners, the association succeeded this year in meeting the water needs of 525,960 people. In the absence of this effort, beneficiaries would not have access to enough and safe water, including for drinking and cooking, and the most vulnerable groups would be forced to walk for long hours under the hot sun in search of water.

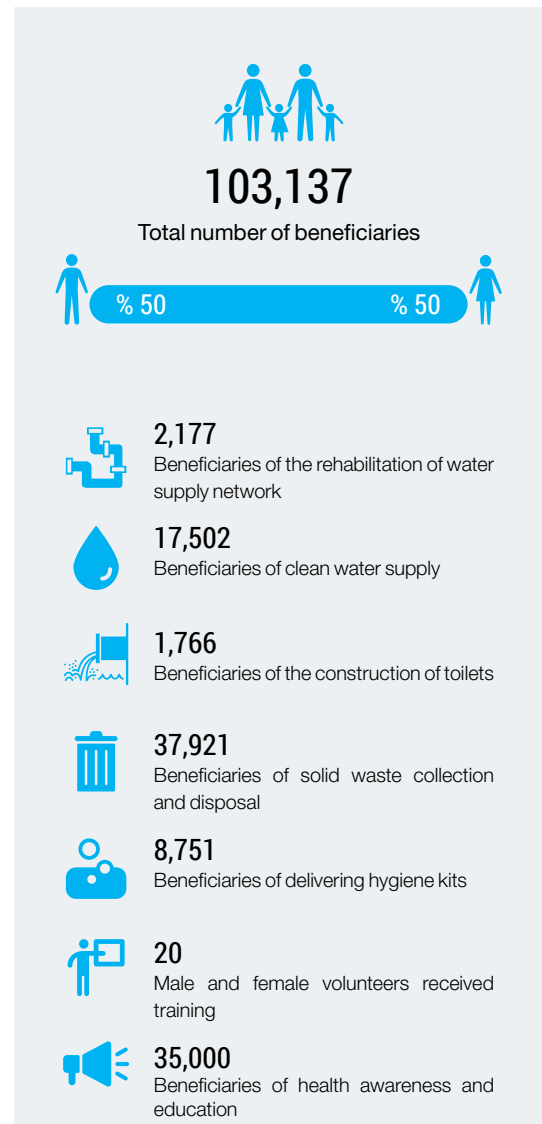
3. Providing life-saving emergency water and sanitation services to the most vulnerable displaced people and host communities

In response to life-threatening water and sanitation issues, Human Access has intensified its efforts to provide safe drinking water and sanitation services. These services also constitute the essential first line of defense to protect the lives of the most vulnerable displaced people and host communities from diseases associated with unclean water and waste accumulation.

More than hundred thousand of the most vulnerable displaced people and host communities in Al Wadi District of Marib Governorate escaped serious health and environmental threats because this year they were able to access life-saving emergency water and sanitation services funded by YHF. To prevent serious health effects on displaced people and host communities, the services included providing clean water and hygiene supplies, construction of toilets, rehabilitation of the water supply network, training of male and female volunteers, awareness-raising activities, and collection and disposal of waste.

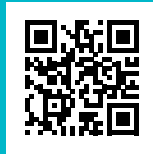
