After twelve months of tireless work, we are pleased to share with you our 2022 Annual HUMAN ACCESS Report as a testament to our presence at the heart of humanitarian action. This report shows our great humanitarian response over the course of a year in Yemen and abroad, and its great positive impact on the lives of the largest number of beneficiaries, in light of the worsening crises in terms of quantity and quality.

The release of this report coincides with the readiness of HUMAN ACCESS to complete its thirty-third year on the nineteenth of March 2023, as a pioneering organization that was able to form a sustainable model and has a large balance of trust with donors. It is the organization that has secured a great place in the humanitarian arena according to a vision that cares about people first, touches their needs and improves their daily living.

The year 2022 was full of challenges for the most vulnerable Yemenis, as humanitarian needs continued to deepen, driven by the cumulative impact of protracted conflict and economic collapse fueled by the Corona pandemic, the war in Ukraine, climate shocks, and others that pushed millions of people to the brink.

HUMAN ACCESS was at the level of the challenge, in partnership with the donors and in coordination with the official authorities, as we raced against time to stop the bleeding of suffering that strikes communities. We also played an active role in responding to the growing needs during the year 2022, helping those in dire need and assisting them to meet their challenges.

This report is the best evidence of HUMAN ACCESS' projects that prioritize work on the main fronts, including food, health, protection, shelter, education, water, hygiene and economic empowerment to alleviate the suffering of the neediest groups, especially those who suffer from additional vulnerabilities such as women, children, orphans, displaced people and refugees.

Our interventions during the year 2022 contributed to alleviating the suffering of many people in need and made a difference in the lives of vulnerable communities, especially as they reached those who deserved them. The interventions also targeted vital and important sectors of human life, in accordance with the principles and standards of humanitarian action, with the highest level of transparency and professionalism and through teams with a great deal of commitment and sincerity.

In addition to our gratitude for all our partners, we are proud of the impact our projects have had on the beneficiaries, and we are proud of the humanitarians and volunteers in our organization.

As we move into the new year, we also look forward to providing life-saving support, improving the lives of the vulnerable, and ensuring people's dignity and preservation, believing in the superiority of humanitarian work under any harsh conditions.

Furthermore, it is our goal to meet human needs and suffering wherever they occur. This is what you will find in the folds of this report, which reviews the achievements of HUMAN ACCESS in 2022 as an extension of its pioneering role in humanitarian and relief work. It contains more details of our humanitarian stance that transformed pain and suffering into hope and sufficiency for a better future for Yemen and Yemenis.

Establishment

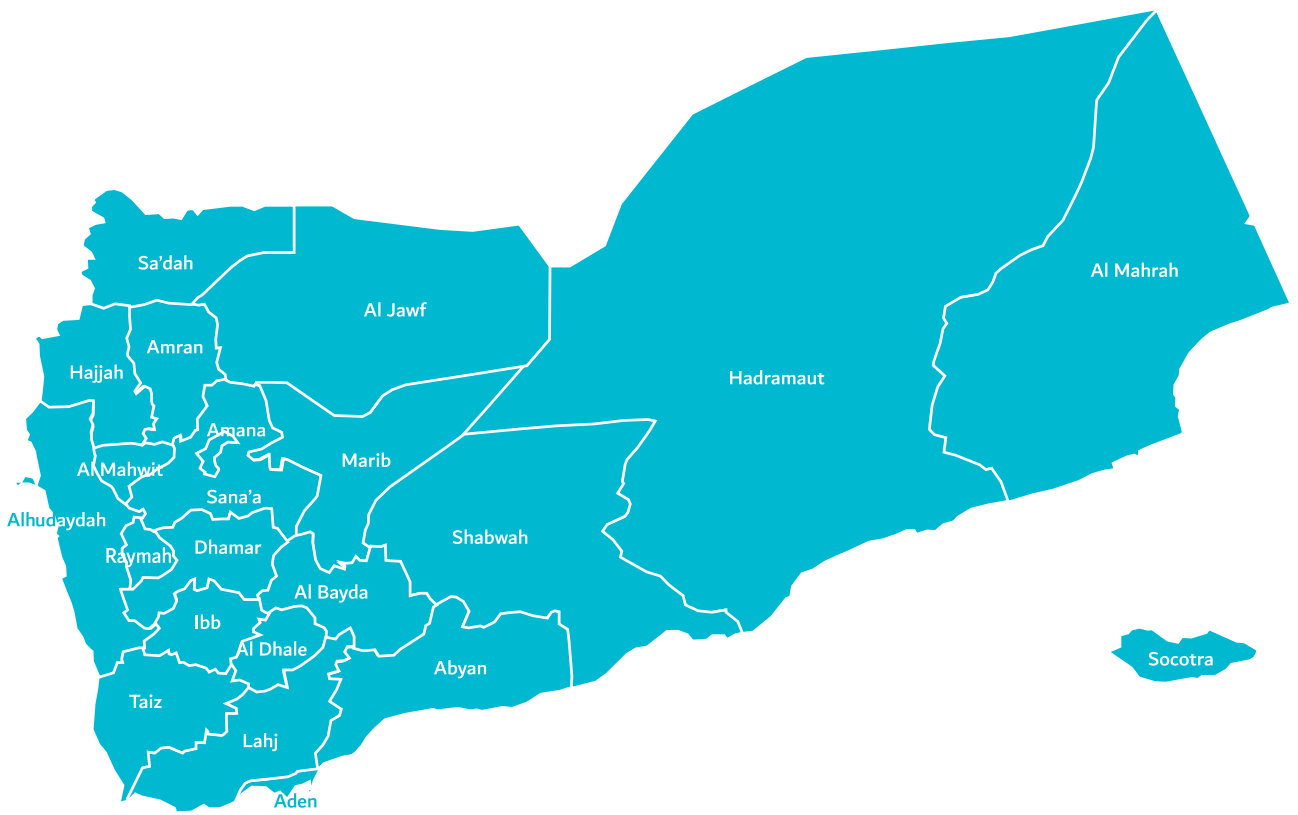
Scope of work

HUMAN ACCESS through its various activities and services operates across all areas of the Republic of Yemen, where it invests in the efforts of a network of workers and volunteers in its (26) branch offices and (279) committees available in the Yemeni governorates and districts, in addition to its external office in Djibouti that provides services to Yemeni refugees in Djibouti. HUMAN ACCESS also seeks to open additional external offices in some neighboring regional countries.



Priorities

HUMAN ACCESS through the 2020 strategy set its priorities during the next phase based on lengthy discussions that lasted several months. It concluded thereby that it is essential to prioritize sustainable development preceding relief and emergency response, considering that sustainable development is the cornerstone and the biggest factor in achieving progress and overall community advancement. It also accorded attention to women, children, and youth as these three groups are the key pillars of community development. The strategy also focused on rural development to contribute to addressing the needs of the countryside, which lacks many of the services despite hosting a large proportion of the population and suffering from a dire need in various sectors of development.

Summary of achievements and interventions during 2022 in food security

Yemenis are facing the worst scenario of food insecurity, with the crises resulting from the conflict in the country collapsing since 2015. As a result of the interaction of several factors, including severe climate changes, Covid-19 epidemic, the war in Ukraine, and others, which have pushed millions of people towards severe levels of hunger.

Since this tragic situation has caused a great deal of concern, HUMAN ACCESS implemented humanitarian projects in the field of food security throughout 2022 that provided a safe haven for a large segment of vulnerable groups as well as contributed to Yemen's critical food security needs.

1. Relief and food care

Yemen witnessed the worst level of deterioration and food insecurity in 2022, as food consumption recorded its worst level, according to UN data, amid the expansion of the poverty and hunger gap and the extension of the humanitarian crisis to include most of the country's estimated population of 31.9 million.

The cost of basic foods became higher than ever before, which has prompted more vulnerable families, including the displaced, to adopt harsh strategies to reduce food consumption to survive. Without urgent action, millions could plunge into starvation.

HUMAN ACCESS has always been proactive in responding to the food security crisis, as it redoubled its efforts to address the acute food problem in Yemen. With the support of donors and partners, it has implemented 14 relief and food projects this year in most governorates.

HUMAN ACCESS efforts culminated in food reaching 634,109 displaced and conflict-affected people, benefiting from food baskets, ready meals, and bread, which are vital aids in preventing famine and the best first line of defense against the heavy loss of life.

2. GFA Food Assistance Project

About half of the population in Yemen still faces an acute shortage of food consumption and became unable to meet their food needs, which puts millions of families in front of a catastrophic reality, especially with the emergence of numerous challenges that have imposed more complications on food imports.

In this context, the food aid project came as an attempt to address the deteriorating food crisis in the country, which was implemented by HUMAN ACCESS in 2022 as a trusted local partner, in collaboration with the World Food Program (WFP) in order to meet the needs of the most vulnerable families.

Indeed, food security has been achieved for 477,655 individuals in Sala district of Taiz governorate, and 11 districts in Lahj governorate, namely: (Al-Qabbaitah, Al-Madaribah and Ras Al-Arah, Habel Jabr, Al-Maflahi, Yafa', Al-Malah, Halmin, Yahar, Al-Had, Tor Al-Baha, Al-Maqatirah), as the needs for food is increasing in these districts.

The components of this vital project included food, cash aid and food vouchers. In light of the global food crisis and the growing living needs in Yemen, this aid came at a time when it was most needed, which helped to maintain a certain level of decent living for thousands of families and prevented famine.

3. Ramadan food projects

In the holy month of Ramadan, HUMAN ACCESS offers hundreds of thousands of Yemenis a chance for hope through the implementation of humanitarian projects that have met a significant part of their food needs. As a result of the armed conflict, consumption rates in the country have increased in light of deteriorating lives for most of its population.

In the month of Ramadan, which is known for its many needs, HUMAN ACCESS implemented 6 food projects with the support of donors and philanthropists. Through these seasonal projects, food baskets, dates, meat and vegetables, as well as fasting breakfasts and ready-to-eat meals were distributed throughout Yemen, with special attention given to the most vulnerable populations in the most affected areas.

The fruits of these projects extended to 478,258 individuals who were not deprived of the joy of breaking the fast in Ramadan and the privacy and privileges of such an annual occasion. Due to the HUMAN ACCESS program that meets the needs of the most vulnerable and needy people, the most essential food commodities for their Ramadan meals were not missing from their tables.

4. Meat and sacrificial (Qurban) projects

The deteriorating living conditions have forced millions of people in Yemen to shorten the necessary meals and to dispense with meat, as all circumstances prevent the majority of the population from buying meat of all kinds.

The matter reached the point that many Yemenis abandoned the idea of buying sacrifices (sheep/goat/cow) on Eid al-Adha, the occasion that represented the only opportunity for millions of people to eat meat, due to the outrageous price and deteriorating financial and economic conditions.

Thus, a large segment of Yemenis lost one of the most important food sources, and Eid al-Adha has become a heavy guest for hundreds of thousands of poor and low-income families. That's why HUMAN ACCESS had to make extraordinary efforts to fill a huge food gap for these families who rarely consume meat.

Its long experience and competence in implementing the sacrificial meat distribution project enabled it to make 588,432 people happy throughout Yemen during the Eid al-Adha, with funding received from a number of donors.

Beneficiary story



“Tahani M.”, 39 years old, her husband died and left behind 5 daughters who live in a dilapidated popular house in Tor Al-Baha district of Lahj governorate.

In light of the reality of scarcity and hunger that still plagues more than half of Yemen's population, this family has no source of income, and the mother does not have a job or other qualifications to practice any profession.

The widow, Tahani, resorted to miserable measures to survive with her daughters after the loss of the family's only breadwinner. Unable to continue their education due to school costs, the girls have cut back on their diets, a common practice in this war-stricken country.

Since the family is one of the most vulnerable groups, it had a share of the GFA food project, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS with funding from the World Food Program (WFP). Because of the project, the family received food and cash assistance, the girls were able to return to school, and the family's living and economic situation improved greatly.

Tahani describes her condition before the humanitarian access, saying, «I was suffering from all difficulties in order to provide food, medicine, and clothes for myself and my daughters.»

Now, the happiness of Tahani is indescribable after receiving this humanitarian aid, which enabled her to provide for some of her needs. She hopes that this support will continue and multiply, as prices have risen to the point where many people can no longer afford the basics of living.

Summary of achievements and interventions during 2022 in Health and Nutrition

In Yemen, engulfed in war, 12.6 million people lack access to basic health care services as health care networks are weak and fragile, which required an unprecedented response to save the lives of vulnerable people.

The projects implemented by HUMAN ACCESS in the field of health and nutrition clearly reveal our active contribution to providing essential health services during the year 2022, in a country where more people are at risk of disease and need assistance.

1. Malnutrition treatment

Yemen is one of the world's most malnourished countries for women and children. According to UN data, there are 2.9 million children and women who are at risk of malnutrition, and they require urgent interventions to provide healthy nutrition services.

With no access to basic health care and food, children and mothers are more vulnerable to preventable diseases because every malnourished child means a family struggling to survive.

The emergency support project for the most vulnerable groups "children under the age of five and pregnant and lactating mothers" with curative and preventive feeding services is one of the qualitative and pioneering projects, which is implemented by HUMAN ACCESS with funding from the World Food Program (WFP).

Because of this project, 447,712 children and pregnant and lactating mothers were able to obtain curative and preventive nutrition and other important services during the period from January to December 2022 in twenty districts within three governorates that combine together multiple levels of vulnerabilities, namely: Taiz, Lahj, and Marib.

Additionally, HUMAN ACCESS provided basic health services for malnourished children under the age of five and pregnant and breastfeeding mothers to 6138 individuals through the supportive health care project to treat malnutrition cases in Al-Misrakh district in Taiz governorate during the period from November to December 2022 with the support of the Kaaf Humanitarian Association.

2. Support for reproductive health services

The protracted conflict in Yemen is having a severe impact on the health care system, such as reproductive health services, which are essential and of human rights. According to the United Nations, every two hours a Yemeni woman dies in childbirth from causes that are almost entirely preventable.

In order to improve access to reproductive health services and support the most vulnerable families of the displaced and host communities, HUMAN ACCESS aided 7 health facilities in the governorates of Hadhramaut, Taiz, Al-Mahrah, and Lahj through the project to support reproductive health services funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).

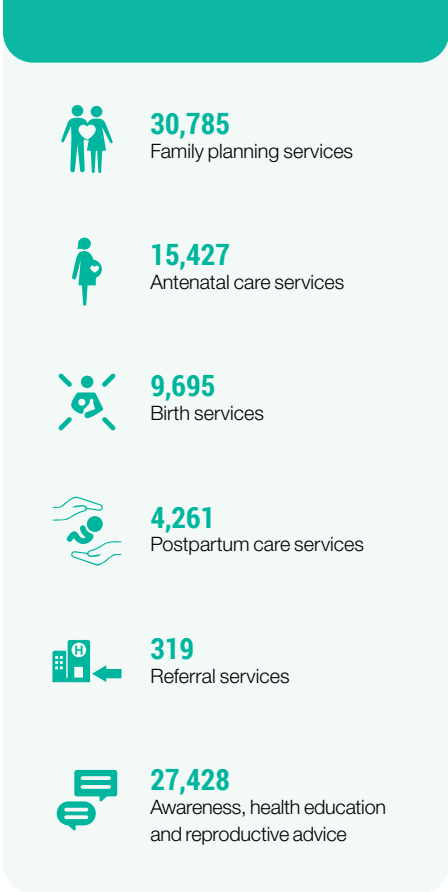
Among the services offered at these health facilities were family planning, prenatal care, safe delivery, postpartum care, referral of critical and emergency cases to higher health levels, as well as awareness, health education, and reproductive counseling.

As a result of this important humanitarian response, 87,915 people in «Tarim, Ghayl Bawazir, Broom Mayfaa, Al-Qahirah, Al-Misrakh, Al-Ghaydah, and Al-Madharibah Wal-Arah» were provided with reproductive health services during 2022, which saved their lives and helped them build a healthier future.

3. MSP Emergency Health Response

Yemen is described as the sixth largest internal displacement crisis in the world. Women and children constitute 77% of the internally displaced, whose number is estimated at 4.3 million people, with more than 60% of them reside in Marib governorate.

Some of the highest levels of vulnerability are concentrated in IDP hosting sites, where very few services are available at a time when IDP camps are experiencing poor sanitary conditions that inevitably affect the lives and health of most people.

As part of its program, HUMAN ACCESS provided essential emergency healthcare services - «trauma and COVID-19» - to protect IDPs and host communities in Marib Al-Wadi from shocks and save their lives, financed by the World Health Organization (WHO).

The package included a set of priority health care services, such as medical consultations, supply of essential medicines to patients, reproductive health services, immunization of children against deadly diseases, medical response to trauma cases and Covid-19, among others, all of which resulted in the health and wellness of 5486 people during December 2022.

4. Promote effective and sustainable access to health services

Taiz is one of the Yemeni cities most affected by the war. It is a densely populated city with many of its residents cannot afford to buy medicine and need a sustainable guarantee of basic services, especially health services which emerge as one of the most acute humanitarian needs.

In order to prevent further deterioration in this humanitarian crisis, described as serious, HUMAN ACCESS facilitated sustainable health services and therapeutic nutrition services to 37,537 people in Al-Misrakh district. As a result of the project, conflict-affected communities in Yemen have received sustainable assistance and effective access to health care from January to May 2022, thanks to the Australian Penny Appeal Organization's support.

Furthermore, HUMAN ACCESS implemented a project to enhance and support a minimum package of health services provided to children and mothers in war-affected communities in Taiz Governorate, specifically in the districts of Al-Qahirah and Al-Mudhaffar, funded by Nas Society for Social Support and the Turkish Doctors Worldwide (DWWT) organization.

From February to December 2022, 71,126 people benefited from the services of this project, that included basic medicine supply, reproductive health services, therapeutic feeding services for children under five, pregnant women and breastfeeding mothers, and other services that alleviated the suffering of those affected by the conflict, particularly since it targeted a vital and important sector of society.

5. Health response to emergency and acute needs

For residents of Yemen's remote districts, seeking emergency health care is a perilous journey, at a time when the health system is on the brink of collapse due to devastating conflict.

Among these districts is Maqbanah, which is considered one of the largest districts in Taiz governorate and is geographically linked to a number of districts affiliated to the neighboring governorates. It also has displaced people fleeing violence, and most of its residents suffer from extreme poverty and lack of services.

In the past, the residents of Maqbanah used to travel to the city of Taiz to obtain basic health care, but now they are unable to do so due to the closure of the main roads and the fact that patients cannot travel for long hours on rugged mountain roads, which is also very expensive.

Given the strong commitment of HUMAN ACCESS to vulnerable populations at risk, it reached this remote district against the odds and offered basic health services to 75,320 individuals from the displaced and host communities during the period from January to June 2022.

This was accomplished through the project to respond to the urgent and acute needs of communities and displaced people in hard-to-reach areas, funded by the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF), which was vital to providing access to basic health care services and expanding health coverage.

6. Integrated provision of a minimum package of WASH and protection services

Most of the displaced live in very difficult conditions and lack the most basic needs, such as clean drinking water and toilets, which compounds their suffering and causes the spread of diseases and epidemics. This reality is getting worse day by day as the conflict continues.

In multiple governorates, including Hadhramaut and Shabwa, displaced people struggle to obtain drinking water and need assistance in meeting their water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) needs.

In order to meet these basic needs, HUMAN ACCESS implemented the Integrated Provision of a Minimum Package of Water, Sanitation, Health and Protection Services project, funded by the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF). It is a project that provided life-saving emergency assistance to 243,466 vulnerable displaced persons, including 116,531 in Al-Shihri district of Hadhramaut and 126,935 in Ataqa district in Shabwa, during the period from February to October 2022.

The project services for this most needy group involved the minimum health services package "MSP", the supply of clean water and the provision of environmental sanitation and protection services for the displaced persons in the targeted new displacement sites.

As a result, a range of services was provided, including dispensing essential medicines, referring critical cases to medical professionals, improving water supply and systems, building toilets, distributing personal hygiene items, training volunteers, and other services that minimized the devastating consequences and limited vulnerability among the displaced.

7. Life-saving emergency health for displaced and conflict-affected communities in Marib

The negative impact of the pressures of the war, since its outbreak in Yemen, has extended to all aspects of life in Marib Governorate, which is at the heart of the conflict. This has exacerbated chronic vulnerabilities of the displaced and local communities and increased needs for life-saving humanitarian assistance, particularly in the area of health care.

In this grim reality, the HUMAN ACCESS response has been life-saving, rapid and essential for the most vulnerable IDPs and host communities, thanks to the Lifesaving Emergency Health Project for IDPs and Conflict-Affected Communities in Marib, funded by the World Health Organization (WHO).

The project, which was implemented in the districts with the highest priority: "Marib City, Marib Al-Wadi, Raghwan" in February 2022, gave hope to 22,196 people by providing medical consultations, basic medicines, reproductive health services, immunizations of children against deadly diseases, referral of critical and emergency cases to a higher level of health, as well as health education and awareness.

8. Health and medical support

The mission of HUMAN ACCESS is to improve healthcare in Yemen by implementing a variety of health interventions, including mobile clinics, medical camps, and the operation of health facilities that provide free, high-quality healthcare to affected people. In this context, HUMAN ACCESS implemented a project to operate the medical clinic at the Community College in Al-Rawdha camp for the displaced in Marib Governorate during the period from January to November 2022, funded by the Humanitarian Relief Foundation (IHH). The project succeeded in providing basic health services and therapeutic nutrition services to 28,941 male and female beneficiaries in Marib city district. As part of HUMAN ACCESS' contributions to providing medical assistance to patients, it carried out an open-heart surgery project in Taiz Governorate during September and October 2022 for 29 patients suffering from heart diseases, with the support of Sheikh Abdullah Al Nouri Charity Society. Because blindness is still a health problem for most developing countries, HUMAN ACCESS has implemented vital ophthalmic projects to reduce avoidable visual impairments to alleviate the suffering of poor and needy people. In this context, the association implemented an emergency relief project for the needy in Yemen to remove cataracts, which also involved the distribution of wheelchairs for the disabled in Al-Qahira district of Taiz, benefiting 180 people during August 2022, with the support of Nas Society for Social Support and the Australian Care Charity. Moreover, a medical surgery project to remove cataracts in Mukalla, Hadhramaut was implemented by the association for 200 cases, in June 2022, funded by the Sheikh Abdullah Al-Nouri Charity Society, which included dispensing medical glasses, medication, and postoperative care. In the city of Seiyun, Hadhramaut, HUMAN ACCESS organization implemented an eye operations project for cataract patients with the support of the Kuwaiti Balad Al-Khair Society, where 65 males and females benefited from the services of this medical project in September 2022.

Beneficiary story



To escape the hell of war and in search of safety in a country that is widely suffering from the worst humanitarian crisis in the world, Yasmin, 35, left with her husband, Ahmed, 39, and their children, from Bajil district in Al Hudeidah governorate to Al Khazzan camp in Al Shihr district, Hadhramaut governorate.

Like any displaced person who was uprooted from his home and left behind property and livelihoods, Yasmin found herself facing great challenges and in dire need of humanitarian assistance. The harsh conditions have forced her to further adopt negative coping strategies in the face of increasing needs and very difficult circumstances.

The biggest problem she had was water, said Yasmin, who had to send her three children to fetch water from far away. Obtaining safe drinking water is a daily routine, which has compounded their suffering in worn-out tents that do not protect their weak bodies.

The widespread disease among the displaced in the camp, the lack of basic necessities such as clean drinking water and toilets, and the lack of adequate healthcare services made Yasmin more fearful and anxious.

However, the suffering and fears did not last long, as HUMAN ACCESS quickly intervened through the project for the integrated provision of a minimum package of water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) and protection services for the most vulnerable displaced persons, funded by the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF).

In February of 2022, Yasmin was feeling happy that an important part of the water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) needs had been met and some of the camp's risks and vulnerabilities had been fended off. «You have restored our dignity,» said Yasmin, summarizing the fruits of this pioneering project.

Summary of achievements and interventions during 2022 in Protection, shelter and non food items

Because of the conflict in Yemen, 9.2 million people from the most vulnerable groups have sought specialized protection from humiliating practices, while 4.4 million families have been affected, displaced, or vulnerable by the conflict and lack adequate shelter and household supplies.

Thus, HUMAN ACCESS has worked hard throughout 2022 to ensure that more people, especially the most vulnerable groups, such as women, girls, and children, have access to protection and shelter services, lighting up paths in this field and using its decades of experience to assist beneficiaries.

1. Safe spaces and psychological support center

Women and girls are among the most vulnerable groups in the Yemeni crisis. As a result of displacement and the disintegration of protection networks over the past years, women and girls have been exposed to greater vulnerability, violence, and serious threats to their individual and collective rights.

There are many women who have lost their husbands and had to endure the pain and suffering with their families and bear the psychological, social and economic pressures. Those women are in dire need of safe spaces as a basis for restoring their normal lives.

That is why HUMAN ACCESS established and managed 11 safe spaces for women and girls, located in 5 governorates, «Hadhramaut, Marib, Al-Mahra, Al-Hodeidah, and Shabwa». It also created a specialized psychological support center in Al-Shihr district in Hadhramaut with funding from the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), due to the exacerbation of mental illnesses in the country.

These spaces recorded great successes during the year 2022 for women and girls benefiting from the services of 18 projects. The number of beneficiaries reached 283,684 women, all of whom received psychosocial and legal support, training, empowerment, literacy, sanitary birthing bags, cash assistance, and other services that women and girls need to preserve their dignity and protect them from multifaceted crises.

2. Life-saving protection services

HUMAN ACCESS has always worked to protect and support the displaced as part of its mission to save lives, protect rights and provide a response to people forced to flee their homes by conflict and who are now at great risk to their lives.

Marib governorate hosts a large number of displaced people, as behind every tent in the displacement camps there are urgent and increasing needs for people whose livelihoods have been cut off. These displaced people are extremely vulnerable, do not enjoy protection, and their very survival depends on life-saving protection services.

Thanks to the extraordinary efforts of HUMAN ACCESS, funded by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), 58,700 individuals of the most vulnerable IDPs and host community in Marib city and Sirwah district received life-saving protection services in 2022.

In spite of the challenges of surviving within displacement camps and local communities lacking the most basic services, these protection services provided psychological and legal support, cash assistance, child-friendly spaces, creation of community protection networks, awareness and education, among others to the forcibly displaced and host communities.

3. Child protection project

Children in humanitarian situations are particularly vulnerable, and protecting them during emergencies is one of the areas of humanitarian responsibility to safeguard their lives and future. Hence, promoting a protective environment for all children and adolescents at all times is a priority for the humanitarian response.

The needs of children in Yemen remain huge, as they are among the most vulnerable groups of all, suffering from limited access to humanitarian assistance, at a time when their protection is most needed.

HUMAN ACCESS in 2022 contributed to providing protection for the most vulnerable children, meeting their essential needs, and strengthening the protection of children and adolescents, with funding from the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF).

During the period from May to July 2022, the Child Protection Project was implemented in Marib city and Al-Wadi in Marib Governorate to address the conflict's impact on children and families.

As a result of the project, 796 individuals received psychological support, birth certificates, medical services, economic empowerment, and family reunification, which helped protect childhood and strengthen the protective environment for accessing child protection services.

4. Shelter and Non-Food Items

There are many threats and shortages of essential supplies that come with displacement, which is an inevitable and tragic outcome of any conflict. The protracted conflict in Yemen has forced millions of people to leave their homes and move into camps and temporary housing.

Most of these displaced people, who have suddenly become homeless, encounter urgent needs and challenges, and became susceptible to every symptom, in societies teetering on disaster and in a critical situation where the majority of Yemenis suffer from extreme poverty.

And had it not been for the relentless commitment of HUMAN ACCESS during 2022 to provide shelter and other essential items to the most vulnerable groups among the displaced affected by the Yemeni crisis, their situation would have been much worse.

As a result of the association's efforts, 17,580 of these displaced persons received kitchen utensils and hygiene bags during January and February, funded by Muslim Aid organization, while 9,000 displaced persons received shelter materials that included mattresses, blankets, clothes and shoes during the period from January to October, with the support of Aman Palestine, Global Peace, and other philanthropists.

A combination of three humanitarian projects resulted in these important interventions by providing basic tools for those displaced from the Capital Sana'a Secretariat, Ibb, and Hajjah to the governorates of Marib and Shabwa, thereby strengthening their steadfastness and confrontation against the many dangers they faced.

5. Eid and winter clothing

Humanitarian response of HUMAN ACCESS includes winter and holiday needs as a seasonal response to mitigate risks and enhance protection for the vulnerable, including the displaced, the poor and orphans.

There is concern over the living conditions of the displaced during the winter months, since their camps are not adequate for their protection and meeting their needs.

And because the commitment of HUMAN ACCESS is strong towards the vulnerable, it rushes annually with the approach of winter to help the vulnerable, as it has already succeeded in providing 27,160 individuals with blankets and winter clothing.

In parallel, the Eid clothing comes to bring joy to children of the neediest families as a priority for HUMAN ACCESS, which implemented the two projects of distributing clothing and gifts for Eid Al-Fitr and Al-Adha in 2022 and brought joy to the hearts of 26,037 children in most Yemen's governorates.

This seasonal humanitarian response culminated in protecting, alleviating suffering, and drawing a smile for 53,197 individuals, with the support of a number of partners and donors, which reduced the chronic vulnerabilities of the beneficiary groups.

Beneficiary story



«Zahr» is one of the victims of the early marriage phenomenon in Yemen. She paid the price for this marriage early when she was unable to pursue education, despite the fact that education is a primary priority and an indispensable step for realizing women's rights and achieving their dreams.

With the escalating conflict in the country since 2015, Zahr was forced to flee with her family to Marib, a governorate that hosts a large number of internally displaced persons. Her suffering was not limited to displacement, despite the burdens and troubles it brings to women and girls in particular.

As Zahr's husband became disabled, she had to bear the burdens and increased needs of the family despite poverty, unemployment, and harsh living conditions in displacement camps lacking the most basic necessities with poor health conditions that negatively affect the lives and health of the displaced.

Zahr found herself facing serious challenges, forcing the family to resort to negative coping mechanisms. Despite all this, a glimmer of hope crept through the HUMAN ACCESS Community Center for IDPs, funded by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

Thanks to this project, Zahr received a first-aid training course. Throughout this course, she developed many skills that enabled her to provide primary health care to the displaced and the community around her, as well as to generate income that helps meet some of her needs in light of the harsh living conditions.

“Now I can save many lives, and this is very important”, Zahr says with pride. She refers to a previous case of a woman who was her neighbor who suffocated in a fire accident and was unable to save her life at that time, which caused her great pain. Zahr adds, “If this situation happened after I got this training course, I would have saved her life.”

Summary of achievements and interventions during 2022 in the field of Multi Sectors Response

For over seven years, Yemen has been engulfed in armed conflict, resulting in a dramatic increase in needs in all sectors, a decline in access to services, an expansion of the needs of those affected groups, and even worsening of their conditions as a result.

In response to these broad needs, HUMAN ACCESS in 2022 has adopted a multi-sector service delivery methodology based on the necessary needs to deliver forms of multi-sectoral response, prioritizing orphans and refugees in this response as they are the most vulnerable.

1. Sponsorship and care of orphans

Comprehensive care for orphans has been one of the most important priorities of HUMAN ACCESS since its inception 33 years ago. In order to implement and focus its responses that target them, it has established a special sector to sponsor and care for orphans who are among the most critical cases.

In 2022, HUMAN ACCESS met the needs of 47,942 male and female orphans in all 22 governorates of Yemen, and brought a smile to their faces through 4 multiple humanitarian projects with the support of a number of donors and partners.

Several sectors were targeted to provide orphans with a comprehensive environment for growth and to become positive, productive, and contributing members of society. These sectors included health, social, living, educational, economic empowerment, and livelihood.

Through this multi-sectoral response, these beneficiaries were able to address the effects of orphanhood, alleviate their suffering, enrich themselves from humiliation, and retain their human dignity, in a country racked by conflict, with children joining the ranks of orphans every day as a result of war.

2. Integrated Response to Yemeni Refugees in Djibouti

Under the scorching sun of Djibouti, there are thousands of Yemeni refugees living who fled the war not out of any desire to migrate or flee, but to save their lives or flee deteriorating conditions in search of humanitarian assistance.

Yemeni refugees living in Djibouti live in very harsh conditions fraught with many dangers and face different types of shocks; they do not see any horizon ahead of them, and the difficult circumstances in their country Yemen make the process of returning difficult.

To improve the lives of those in dire need of assistance, HUMAN ACCESS implemented through its branch in Djibouti 9 humanitarian projects with the support of many donors and partners during 2022 to secure their basic needs, as part of the multi-sectoral response.

The association has made great progress by reaching 17,956 Yemeni refugees in Djibouti, most of them females, with food baskets, dates, Eid al-Fitr clothes for children, distribution of Eid meat sacrifices, school bags, and cash assistance, as well as distributing medicines for chronic diseases.

3. Refugee health project in Aden and Lahj

Despite the conflict in Yemen, it remains a destination for thousands of refugees from the Horn of Africa who risk their lives crossing the sea in search of a better life, increasing the burden on overstretched services and exacerbate the vulnerabilities of the displaced and the host community.

A large part of these refugees settles in a poor neighborhood of Al-Basateen in Aden governorate and in Kharaz camp in Lahj governorate. Access to health services is even more difficult for these refugees and they are forced to contend with malnutrition, disease outbreaks and poor health outcomes, putting the lives and health of everyone at risk.

Here lies the importance of the health project for refugees in Aden and Lahj, which was carried out by HUMAN ACCESS with funding from the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), to provide multiple services, including primary health care and therapeutic nutrition services.

This project facilitated services to 345,978 people during the year 2022, including refugees, asylum seekers, internally displaced people, and host communities, resulting inevitably in the improvement of health conditions throughout the country and the saving of many lives.

Beneficiary story



In 2020, Siham Mohammad's husband died, leaving her with 6 children, in light of the difficult living conditions in Yemen. Siham, 32, has become a lonely woman facing enormous challenges, starting with securing food for her children, and not ending with paying the rent for the house she lives in Sana'a with her children, who are shocked by the decease of their father.

Having suffered severe loss, Siham and her children had to move to her father's home and contend with an existence without hope, living on the margins of life.

In a country wracked by war and with limited access to basic services, Siham has become completely unable to provide and satisfy the many needs of her children.

In the midst of this painful reality, Siham learned that an organization called HUMAN ACCESS stands with the neediest families of orphans and works to support and provide them with economic opportunities. This woman reached HUMAN ACCESS and obtained a sewing machine, as she has skills in sewing clothes and handicrafts.

Using the sewing machine, Siham sewed and embroidered clothes, and her children's standard of living improved because of the source of income she earned.

This small project also enabled her to be more self-reliant and contribute to the economy and society. Siham now has great ambition to develop her small project.

Therefore, the association focused on educational projects in 2022 to contribute to the recovery of the education sector in Yemen due to the devastating effects of the war. It also paid great attention to economic empowerment projects to help the vulnerable deal more effectively with living needs.

1. Bag and school uniform project

As a result of the war, most Yemeni families are economically disadvantaged, as it makes it difficult for many of them to send their children to school due to the high cost of education requirements, and students began dropping out of school in alarming numbers. Education is essential to every child's future, and every child deserves a chance to attend school.

For the purpose of ensuring that the most vulnerable children were able to learn, HUMAN ACCESS in 2022 supported parents in providing school supplies to their children through the bag and uniform project, which provided school bags containing supplies and uniforms as essential supplies in light of the deteriorating living conditions.

Thanks to this important project, HUMAN ACCESS has helped 8,614 male and female students continue learning and the love of education in the governorates of Hadhramaut, Taiz, Marib, Hodeidah, and Shabwa, funded by the Humanitarian Relief Foundation (IHH), Diyanet, the Business Committee, the International Islamic Charity Organization (IICO), Aman Palestine, and Global Peace organization.

2. Support and rehabilitation of educational infrastructure

As part of its interventions to support Yemen's education sector, which has been most affected by the bitter conflict, HUMAN ACCESS in 2022 rehabilitated the infrastructure of the facilities of the Institute for the Gifted in Mukalla, Hadhramaut Governorate, and constructed the nursing institute for female students in Marib Governorate, with funding from the Kuwaiti Global Charity Association for Development (Tanmeia).

Further, HUMAN ACCESS completed, to the highest specifications, the second phase of the Owais Al-Qarni Educational Complex project in Taiz Governorate, funded by the Humanitarian Relief Foundation (IHH).

Worth to note that a number of facilities are available at this complex that are designed to support innovation and creativity-fostering activities.

As a result of these three qualitative projects, 2,400 individuals have been provided with a stimulating and good educational environment, enhancing their educational achievement.

More importantly, these projects meet the needs of students' knowledge thirst, achieve equal educational opportunities for all, and push the wheel of education forward.

3. Empowerment and livelihood support

HUMAN ACCESS believes that employment and income generation are the most effective ways to help families and communities in Yemen cope with persistent shocks, eradicate poverty, and promote sustainable development.

In order to address the urgent need for livelihood opportunities, especially among the most vulnerable families, the association implemented 161 projects within the framework of economic empowerment during the year 2022 in a number of governorates.

It thus succeeded in involving 966 individuals in the labor market and enabling them to seize economic opportunities, with the support of the Humanitarian Relief Foundation (IHH), Just Human organization, the Global Charity Association for Development (Tanmeia), and Namaa Charity Association.

The empowerment projects included raising sheep and bees, making perfumes and incense, sewing machines, fishing boats and motorcycles, vegetable and fruit shops, and other small projects that allowed people and their families to rebuild their lives in a dignified manner.

Furthermore, these projects have made a difference in the lives of the targeted families and enhanced their ability to cope with crises and achieve self-reliance, in light of the severe lack of funding for relief programs in the country.

Beneficiary story



Afrah Bayashoot, 35 years old, from Tarim district in Hadhramaut governorate. Having lost her husband, she has four children, no source of income, and often donations from charitable people do not arrive, making living conditions harsh for her.

Afrah's thinking and preoccupation was to find a job that would provide her and her children with a suitable source of income to protect them from hunger and disease, but she lives in a country whose unemployment rates have increased since the armed conflict began.

After a hard effort, she worked in a sewing workshop, but inflation devoured her meager income. With prices booming and the local currency collapsing, she has exhausted most of the available coping mechanisms.

Afrah tried to look for another job to escape the hardships of life, as she had sufficient handicrafts and professional skills in sewing. She was suddenly lucky enough to get a tailoring empowerment project from HUMAN ACCESS, funded by Just Human organization.

Here, luck smiled at this grieving family with the departure of its only breadwinner. Afrah, after owning this small project with its supplies, became engaged in sewing, which is one of the professions that represent a major refuge for many families in Yemen.

This private, economically feasible project meets an important part of Afrah's needs and enables her to face the worsening living crises and educate her children. It is an enterprise that grows with Afrah's good reputation and consumers' confidence in her products.

Summary of achievements and interventions during 2022 in Water and environmental sanitation

The humanitarian response under HUMAN ACCESS encompasses every aspect of life, including water and sanitation as millions of Yemenis face water shortages every day. There are 11.2 million people in urgent need of clean water, hygiene and environmental sanitation services.

HUMAN ACCESS 2022 projects in the field of water and environmental sanitation are a prominent example of efforts to improve access to safe drinking water and support efforts to improve the environment, in a country that is one of the most suffering from water scarcity and deterioration of environmental sanitation services.

1. Water projects

HUMAN ACCESS plays a key role in ensuring water security in Yemen by digging wells and providing solar energy for their operations, as well as providing water networks for the poorest communities.

Nine projects executed by HUMAN ACCESS in 2022 provided access to water in sufficient quantities for 7,589 people in Shabwa Governorate and Wusab district of Dhamar Governorate, with the support of Aman Palestine and Just Human organizations, as well as some philanthropists.

These qualitative projects included drilling wells with requirements to operate them with renewable energy, providing a water network to improve the quality of life in the targeted areas, promoting health practices, and ensuring that more children and women benefit from safe water supply services.

The search for potable water is a daily routine in the country, where the responsibility for fetching water always falls on the shoulders of children and women. With climate change, this problem is becoming worse, which is why HUMAN ACCESS' projects have resonated with beneficiaries.

2. Water support

As a result of the ongoing economic and living crisis in Yemen, the suffering of the majority of the population has reached their homes, where they can't even provide the basic necessities such as food, medicine, and clean water for their families.

Due to the scarcity of water that threatens an essential element of life, a large percentage of people find it extremely difficult to obtain drinking water.

As part of an emergency response to the most vulnerable groups among the displaced and those affected by the Yemeni crisis, HUMAN ACCESS supplied, during the period from January to July 2022, potable water through water trucks for 555,840 people in the governorates of Marib, Taiz, at a rate of 100 liters per day for each family.

This project, supported by Muslim Aid, Global organization, Balad Al-Khair Charity, Sadaqa organization, and Wifa Foundation, helped the beneficiaries and made their lives better by bringing water that's too expensive for them. It also spared them arduous search trips to fetch water, support hygiene practices, and live in a sustainable environment.

3. Delivery of water tanks

HUMAN ACCESS plays a major role in meeting water needs in Taiz due to the seriousness of the water situation there. This governorate is currently facing a suffocating and chronic water crisis, as most of its water resources have become suspended, and water costs have increased substantially due to the ongoing conflict.

With this in mind, during the months of September and October 2022, HUMAN ACCESS delivered 600 water tanks - each with a capacity of 500 liters - funded by Muslim Care. As a result of this support, displaced and affected families have been able to store water to benefit from it in the face of water challenges.

Additionally, these tanks reduced the real suffering of the beneficiary families who were unable to pay for these tanks before HUMAN ACCESS intervened.

Beneficiary story



«We fled from the war of bullets to the war of lack of services»... This is what «Munir Abdullah», 35, said in his description of the displaced situation he and a large number of displaced people living in «Al-Mudhallal» camp in Ataq City, Shabwa Governorate.

Al-Mudhallal camp is considered one of the oldest camps in Ataq and one of the symbols of the protracted crisis of the Yemeni displaced. This camp has become a temporary shelter for about 221 families who fled the war, including Munir, who sought safety with his family, consisting of his wife and six children.

However, this camp, which houses the most vulnerable groups of the displaced and marginalized, lacks the most basic life-saving services, such as toilets, which are almost non-existent there. Moreover, water sources are almost non-existent, and obtaining them is a daunting task.

In this challenging environment, the displaced in the camp found hope through the integrated provision of a minimum package of WASH, health and protection services for the most vulnerable IDPs.

Through the project, developed by HUMAN ACCESS in partnership with the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF), 64 toilets were constructed and water supply was provided, greatly improving the quality of life for displaced populations.

Everyone was delighted, including the displaced “Munir”, who commented, “This is what we have been waiting for for a long time.”
