Editorial



Water and Sanitation Services: Everyone's Responsibility

Access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene services is not a privilege, but a human right. Access to these essential services is crucial for human health, survival, and sustainable development.

In Yemen, the ongoing conflict has disrupted public services, particularly in the water and sanitation sector, and exacerbated the risks posed by climate change. According to the 2026 Yemen Humanitarian Response Plan, more than 14 million people require assistance with water, sanitation, and hygiene.

Ensuring equitable and inclusive access to water, sanitation, and hygiene services is everyone's responsibility. This is essential to protect the health, dignity, and well-being of Yemenis, strengthen the resilience of the most vulnerable communities, and support recovery, stability, and peace in Yemen, one of the world's most water-scarce countries and among the most fragile and vulnerable to climate change.

For this reason, HUMAN ACCESS association prioritizes water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH)

programs and projects, especially in the most vulnerable communities. We are committed to fulfilling our responsibilities to improve access to safe, reliable, and sustainable water and sanitation services for people and communities across Yemen.

Through successful partnerships with donors, the association is expanding its WASH and climate response and reaffirms its commitment to supporting sustainable solutions in this vital sector. This ensures the sustainability of these essential services and builds resilience to climate change amidst increasing water scarcity and environmental pressures.

Continued support from donors and partners enables HUMAN ACCESS to significantly increase access to safe drinking water, sanitation, and hygiene services, ensuring these essential services reach those who need them most, particularly in hard-to-reach areas.

Hadhramaut Governor meets with HUMAN ACCESS leadership, commending its humanitarian and development role

Over 643,000 Beneficiaries Benefit from Qurbani Project

In a new achievement reflecting the remarkable efforts made to implement projects to the fullest extent, HUMAN ACCESS, with the support of several donors and partners, successfully implemented the Udhiyah (Qurbani) project for this year, 1447 AH (2026), with high efficiency, under the slogan “We deliver your sacrifice with love.”

Over 643,552 people from the most vulnerable groups benefited from the Udhiyah meat distributed through this project implemented in Yemen and Djibouti. This success confirms HUMAN ACCESS's accumulated experience in implementing similar projects in previous years and affirms its leading position in charitable and humanitarian work.

In a press statement, Mr. Yahya Hasan Al-Dabaa, Head of HUMAN ACCESS, said that the timely and optimal completion of this year's Udhiyah project is a result of the successful partnership between the or-

Ramadan Charity Projects Reach Over a Quarter Million Beneficiaries

In a new seasonal achievement, 281,606 people, both inside and outside Yemen, benefited from Ramadan charity projects this year (1447 AH - 2026). These projects, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS during the holy month of Ramadan, were supported by generous partners and targeted the most vulnerable families, including the poor, orphans, internally displaced persons, refugees, and those affected by conflict. The acts of charity during Ramadan were numerous, including the distribution of food baskets containing essential food items to meet families' daily needs, the delivery of ready-made Iftar meals prepared to the highest quality standards, the organization of communal Iftar meals, the distribution of meat, dates, and cash assistance, as well as the donation of Eid clothing and Zakat al-Fitr (charity given at the end of Ramadan).

The Ramadan aid efforts were not limited to the most vulnerable and impoverished groups in Yemen, but extended to Yemeni refugees and the host community in the Republic of Djibouti. This support aimed to assist deserving families, bring joy and happiness during the holy month of Ramadan and Eid al-Fitr, and reinforce the values of social solidarity, stemming from a sense of social responsibility

towards those most in need.

This multifaceted Ramadan aid brought joy and happiness to the beneficiaries, who expressed their gratitude for this humanitarian support, which came at a time when they were most in need. It significantly alleviated their burdens and instilled a sense of solidarity amidst the prevailing difficult economic and living conditions.

Abdulrahman bin Hamoud Al-Sumait

Dedicated himself to charitable work, devoting most of his time, effort, and money to it

A physician who chose relief work, he dedicated himself, his time, effort, and money to charitable endeavors. He was deeply attached to Africa and its people, and for decades, he made no distinction between Muslims and non-Muslims on the African continent in his charitable work, because they all share the right to humanity.

He is Abdulrahman bin Hamoud Al-Sumait, born on October 15, 1947, in Kuwait. He dedicated himself to developmental charitable work after experiencing the joy and satisfaction of helping others who were in dire need of the basic necessities of life, especially marginalized communities in Africa.

Education

As a child, Al-Sumait was religious and passionate about reading, which distinguished him from his peers and made him more aware of the world around him. He completed his early education in Kuwaiti schools, earning his primary, intermediate, and secondary school certificates. His journey with humanistic thought began during

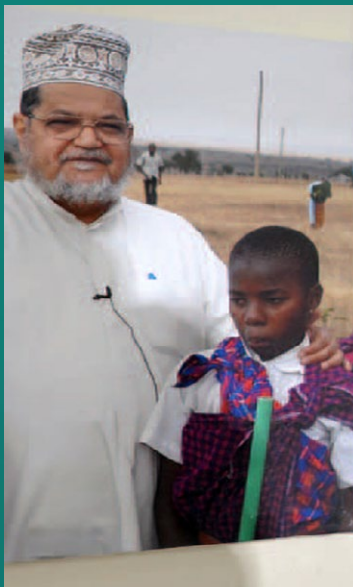


his secondary school years, when he and his friends pooled their daily allowances to buy a car. One of them would then transport laborers to their workplaces or homes free of charge.

After completing secondary school, he was sent to Iraq to study medicine and surgery at the University of Baghdad, graduating in July 1972. He then obtained a diploma in tropical medicine from the University of Liverpool in April 1974. After years of experience abroad, he returned to Kuwait to work as a gastroenterologist at Al-Sabah Hospital from 1980 to 1983, and published numerous scientific and medical research papers.

Responsibilities

Al-Sumait abandoned a life of luxury and dedicated himself to humanitarian work, holding numerous positions and responsibilities in charitable organizations. These included serving as Secretary-General and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Direct Aid Society. He was a founding member of the International Islamic Charitable Organization (IICO) and



the World Islamic Council for Da'wah and Relief, and a member of the Kuwaiti Al-Najat Charitable Society and the Kuwait Red Crescent Society. He also served as Director of the Center for Research and Studies on Charitable Work in Kuwait.

He provided small development projects for the poor, vulnerable, and needy, such as opening grocery stores, offering sewing machines, or establishing fish farms. These projects generated income, lifted people out of poverty, and often had a profound impact on their lives.

Awards and Honors

Al-Sumait received numerous medals, awards, shields, and certificates of appreciation in recognition of his charitable efforts. Among the most prestigious of these was the King Faisal International Prize for Service to Islam. Other awards and honors included the Knight of Charitable Work Medal from the Emirate of Sharjah in 2010, the Charitable Work Award from the Qatar Foundation Dar Al-Inma in 2010, and the Gulf Cooperation Council Heads of State Medal for Charitable Work in 1986.

Death

Al-Sumait survived several assassination attempts in Africa by armed militias due to his presence among the poor and needy. He also endured hardship living in impoverished areas, suffering from mosquito bites, diseases, and epidemics in various locations. After a long life of giving and a long struggle with illness, Abdulrahman Al-Sumait passed away on August 15, 2013. He had, however, exemplified the most remarkable sacrifices in the service of humanitarian and charitable work. He was universally recognized for his tireless dedication to upholding humanity throughout his nearly three decades of service.

A huge number of Kuwaitis and expatriates from all sects, movements and social classes came out to carry the body of Abdulrahman Al-Sumait in a solemn funeral procession so large that its end could not be seen. The Emir of Kuwait ordered that one of Kuwait's streets be named after him in appreciation of his great deeds and distinguished services in charitable and humanitarian work and to immortalize his name.



Digital Volunteering: A Modern Phenomenon

Expanding the Scope of Charitable Work

Dr. Walid Rashad, Professor of Sociology at the National Center for Social and Criminological Research in Egypt, affirmed that digital volunteering has become a modern social phenomenon that has expanded with the spread of the internet.

Speaking on a television program on Al-Nas TV, the sociology professor pointed out the possibility for individuals to participate in charitable or social activities online without leaving their homes, reflecting a shift in patterns of community participation with technological advancements.

He explained that digital volunteering encompasses broad fields, such as managing charitable organizations' accounts and raising digital awareness by publishing content related to health, safety, the environment, and combating bullying on social media. He emphasized that the internet has provided new

opportunities for collaboration and offering assistance in innovative ways.

He added that digital volunteering also extends to providing technical support to charitable organizations, managing digital communities, responding to followers' inquiries, organizing online content, as well as writing articles and producing awareness videos that support social issues and humanitarian initiatives.

The sociology professor pointed out that this type of volunteering expands the scope of charitable work to reach a larger number of people worldwide. It also saves time and effort and helps volunteers acquire new skills such as communication, project management, and teamwork, thus strengthening their sense of belonging and social responsibility.

Volunteer work helps youth succeed in the job market



Mohammed Ali, a training, development, and capacity-building consultant, stated that volunteer work represents a genuine service to society and the nation, and helps young people gain practical experience that qualifies them for the job market.

In an interview on a television program on Channel 2, the consultant explained that preparing young people for the job market depends primarily on acquiring skills and practical training. He clarified that volunteer work is one of the most important means of building and developing these skills.

He emphasized that volunteer work contributes to

developing time management, teamwork, and rapid learning skills, in addition to its religious and social value. He stressed the importance of raising awareness about the culture of organized volunteer work by establishing specialized institutions and platforms. The consultant called for more attention to volunteer work, as it is a fundamental pillar in building qualified personnel, explaining that volunteering is giving time and effort without financial compensation, and it is available to all ages.

With Amuda's support: Humanitarian interventions brimming with life and hope

Funded by the Amuda Association, and in the presence of its president, Ms. Gamza Ghaz Shalak, and her accompanying team, who are currently visiting Yemen, HUMAN ACCESS implemented a series of essential and vital interventions in the governorates of Hadhramaut and Marib to alleviate the suffering of vulnerable populations. In the city of Seiyun in Wadi Hadhramaut, various economic empowerment projects were distributed to 14 families of orphans, aiming to provide a stable source of income that ensures a dignified life for the orphans. Additionally, clothing and toys were donated to 100 orphans, bringing joy and happiness to these children. In Marib, food and cash assistance was distributed to 700 families to alleviate the suffering of the most vulnerable and needy groups and improve their living conditions. Furthermore, 300 winter kits and 500 blankets were donated to protect vulnerable people from the harsh cold and health risks of winter. Clothing and toys were also distributed to 100 orphans

to bring them joy. In addition, 55 wheelchairs (both electric and manual) were delivered to help people with disabilities move around, access services, and improve their health. These wheelchairs meet essential needs for this vulnerable group.

On the sidelines of the visit to Yemen, the head of the Amuda Association and her accompanying team visited some of the ongoing and previously implemented activities, including water distribution points in several displacement camps and the provision of essential, life-saving health and nutrition services for children through the primary healthcare department at Kara General Hospital in Marib.

The head of the Amuda Association praised the pioneering efforts to implement these important interventions, the positive impact of which has been felt by all beneficiaries, while HUMAN ACCESS expressed its thanks and appreciation to the Amuda Association for this humanitarian support to help the needy and affected groups in Yemen.



Marib: Civil Status Office Development Project Inaugurated in Al-Rawdah District



Funded by the UNHCR and implemented through the HUMAN ACCESS branch in Marib Governorate, the Civil Status and Civil Registry Office in Al-Rawdah District was inaugurated as part of the Integrated Project for Infrastructure Development through Quick Impact Projects.

In the presence of Brigadier General Najib Al-Nasser, Assistant Director of Marib Security, and Mr. Shekelkam Shehu, Head of the UNHCR Office in Marib, the project was inaugurated. The project aims to facilitate access to services provided by the Civil Status Office, reduce overcrowding, streamline and improve work management, and expedite the issuance of official documents, which are essential for accessing vital services and rights.

The project included a range of support, such as providing equipment and furniture based on the requirements of the Civil Status Office in Al-Rawdah District, installing mobile barriers to manage the flow of beneficiaries, partitioning one of the halls, and providing an external caravan. This has enabled the office to serve hundreds of beneficiaries daily. During the opening, the Civil Status and Civil Registry Department in Al-Rawda district honored the HUMAN ACCESS association and the UNHCR office in Marib, in appreciation and recognition of the good efforts and effective contributions in developing the department, to serve beneficiaries and support obtaining official documents as a human right and one of the necessities of public life.



UNFPA Representative in Yemen Commends HUMAN ACCESS's Efforts

The UNFPA Representative in Yemen, Francesco Galtieri, commended the outstanding efforts of the HUMAN ACCESS Association in supporting the rights of women and girls in Yemen, including vital interventions in the field of reproductive health. This came during field visits by the UN official and his accompanying delegation to several activities implemented by HUMAN ACCESS in the governorates of Aden, Taiz, and Hodeidah.

The visits included several safe spaces for women and girls, part of a project to provide livelihood services to the most vulnerable women and girls in Yemen, as well as visits to a number of health facilities included in a project supporting reproductive health services.

During the visits, Galtieri reviewed the services provided to women and girls, such as protection, psychosocial support, livelihoods, and reproductive health services. He also listened to several beneficiaries and praised HUMAN ACCESS's leading role in supporting and protecting women and providing essential humanitarian assistance as a priority. In partnership with the United Nations Population Fund, HUMAN ACCESS manages 16 safe spaces for women and girls in seven Yemeni governorates, along with supporting 11 health facilities to provide a comprehensive package of essential services that respond to the urgent needs of women and girls, contributing to enhancing their dignity and resilience under difficult humanitarian conditions.



Diverse and Meaningful Activities to Mark International Women's Day



To mark International Women's Day, which falls on March 8th each year, and under the theme "Rights, justice, work for all women and girls," HUMAN ACCESS carried out a number of meaningful activities as part of its project to provide livelihood services to the most vulnerable women and girls in Yemen, funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). In Ataq, the capital of Shabwa Governorate, a Ramadan evening was organized in a local market frequented by working women. The event was attended by Ms. Samah Al-Khader, Secretary-General of the Yemeni Women's Union in the governorate, who praised HUMAN ACCESS's efforts and UNFPA's support in protecting women's rights. The Ramadan evening included a variety of engaging and meaningful activities, such as recreational competitions to foster joy and a positive atmosphere, honoring a successful woman, and speeches emphasizing the importance of supporting the rights and empowerment of all women and girls to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals.

In Marib Governorate, a special event was held at Al-Jufaina camp for internally displaced persons (IDPs). The event had two main components. The

first focused on supporting women with disabilities and involved an awareness session to boost self-confidence and promote self-esteem, as well as recreational activities.

The second component aimed to support and empower women. This included a bazaar showcasing and selling women's products to encourage self-reliance, a corner dedicated to psychological well-being to promote self-care, and recognition of the event's organizers and a group of successful women for their efforts and contributions to the community. In Al-Rawda area, 30 women working in local markets and stalls across various crafts were honored. The recognition included certificates of appreciation and symbolic gifts to encourage them to continue working, achieve their aspirations, and overcome life's challenges. In Al-Wadi district, ready-made iftar meals were delivered to 10 women survivors of gender-based violence, under the slogan "A meal of hope and food," in an effort to alleviate the suffering of families living in difficult conditions, as well as raising awareness of the importance of the rights of women and girls, on the occasion of International Women's Day.



Water and Sanitation Services **A Priority for Yemenis** Amidst Numerous Challenges





Yemen is among the world's poorest countries in terms of water resources, ranking at the bottom of the list of countries below the water poverty line. The ongoing conflict, deteriorating infrastructure, and climate change are pushing the country toward a worsening water crisis.

Each year, Yemenis' access to water, a vital lifeline not only for drinking but also for hygiene, health, and preventing the spread of diseases such as cholera, acute diarrhea, and typhoid, is declining.

Factors such as displacement and reduced rainfall

have increased pressure on water supply networks, threatening the lives of millions and exacerbating the spread of epidemic diseases within a complex humanitarian situation that demands urgent and sustainable solutions.

For this reason, HUMAN ACCESS association is working to provide water, sanitation, and hygiene services in Yemen through well-planned and diverse projects, aiming to uphold the human right to access safe water and a healthy environment across all Yemeni governorates.

In emergency situations, the association provides urgent relief to local communities threatened by service disruptions and the risk of disease outbreaks. It also contributes to achieving sustainability in the water and sanitation sector and realizing Sustainable Development Goal 6, which guarantees access to clean water and sanitation for all.

Water and Sanitation Crisis in Yemen

Yemen has no permanent rivers and relies heavily on rainfall and rapidly dwindling groundwater. The majority of

the population depends on unsafe water sources or purchases water at exorbitant prices that consume what little remains of their meager incomes.

Potable water is scarcer than ever. According to official statistics, the per capita share of renewable water resources in Yemen does not exceed 80 cubic meters annually, a figure far below the global minimum of 1,000 cubic meters.

More than 40% of the population still lacks access to safe water through networks, particularly in rural areas,

which represent approximately 65% of Yemen's total area and population.

According to the 2026 Yemen Humanitarian Response Plan, launched by the United Nations and its humanitarian partners, 14.4 million people require assistance with water, sanitation, and hygiene.

Women bear the brunt of the water collection process, often traveling long distances in some rural areas to fetch water, which impacts their health and safety and increases girls' school dropout rates.

Over 128,000 people benefited from water supply services during the year

Amid the water crisis in Yemen, HUMAN ACCESS plays a vital role in increasing access to drinking water and water for daily use. This is achieved through drilling and rehabilitating wells, restoring water distribution networks, establishing water distribution points, and providing clean water via tanker trucks.

The organization's services also extend to distributing



containers for transporting and storing water to ensure safe drinking water, especially in displacement camps. Additionally, it supplies plastic tanks to ensure safe and hygienic water storage, helping vulnerable groups overcome transportation difficulties and reducing the burden of purchasing water.

HUMAN ACCESS services also include providing families with chlorine tablets, a vital measure for disinfecting drinking water and preventing waterborne diseases. Water filters are also distributed to homes, essential

for improving the quality of drinking and cooking water, as they remove impurities and purify the water.

Thanks to a successful partnership with a group of donor partners, 128,094 people in several Yemeni governorates benefited from these vital services during 2025. These important interventions had a positive and tangible impact on the beneficiary communities amidst one of the world's most complex humanitarian and environmental crises.

Severe climate crisis affects the most vulnerable groups

Yemen is facing a severe climate crisis and is classified among the world's most vulnerable countries. It requires significant donor support to expand adaptation programs, particularly in the water sector, which is the lifeline for millions of people.

International and UN reports confirm that Yemen is one of the countries most vulnerable to the devastating effects of climate change, with clear and profound humanitarian repercussions that dispro-

portionately affect the most vulnerable groups.

HUMAN ACCESS encompasses numerous interventions that contribute to mitigating the effects of climate change, building resilience, and enhancing community adaptive capacity. These interventions include improving water resource management, promoting clean energy, developing agriculture, managing waste, and more.

In flood-prone areas, the organization rapidly provides support to those affected, diverting floodwaters and

creating drainage channels, as well as constructing protective barriers in displacement sites. This strengthens the resilience of local communities to climate shocks and reduces the impact of disasters.

High needs require mobilization of resources

Access to safe and clean drinking water and sanitation is a human right, and the conflict that has raged for over a decade has severely impacted Yemenis' access to sufficient water and sanita-

tion services.

The humanitarian community in Yemen is struggling to meet the demand for clean drinking water, given the limited funding available for water and sanitation projects. This has left many families without the support they need, and the continuation of this situation threatens the lives of millions and exacerbates the spread of infectious diseases.

In a press statement, Dr. Abdulwase Alwasai, Secretary-General for HUMAN ACCESS, said that water



and sanitation needs remain extremely high due to the conflict, natural disasters, and disease outbreaks. He called on donors to provide more support to help millions of Yemenis access clean drinking water and safe sanitation services.

Dr. Alwasai stated that HUMAN ACCESS is working to ensure access to safe drinking water, sanitation, and hygiene services for people across Yemen, based on assessment studies and in coordination with local authorities and communities. He added that they are

seeking further support from donors and partners to enable more Yemenis to access clean water and address environmental threats and climate change in Yemen.

Sanitation Services: A first line of defense against disease

HUMAN ACCESS prioritizes sanitation services, recognizing their vital importance to individual and community well-being, promoting human dignity, and enhancing safety.

Sanitation is crucial for disease prevention and risk

reduction, and a lack of sanitation services can hinder individual prosperity and sustainable development.

In 2025, HUMAN ACCESS implemented a sanitation development project in the Al-Suwaida IDP camp in Marib Governorate, funded by UNHCR. This is part of an integrated project aimed at reducing the spread of diseases and epidemics linked to the lack of sanitation services, and at contributing to improving the quality of life in displacement camps scattered due to the ongoing conflict in Yemen.

The project, implemented in the new residential block No. 16 in Al-Suwaida camp, included the construction of a large septic tank with a sedimentation pond for wastewater treatment, as well as the establishment of a safe sewage network connecting all latrines to the collection tank. This protects displaced persons from health and environmental hazards and promotes a sense of dignity, security, and stability.

Promoting hygiene is essential to preventing the spread of epidemics

Improving hygiene practices leads to better health, confidence, and overall development. For families, good hygiene means avoiding disease and reducing health-care costs. This is why HUMAN ACCESS focuses on promoting hygiene in Yemen.

In 2025, the organization provided hygiene kits to internally displaced persons (IDPs), the host community, and health facilities in Al-Shihr District, Hadhramaut

Governorate, through the Multi-Sectoral Assistance to Save Lives project, funded by the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF).

The hygiene kits contained essential and comprehensive supplies that contributed to improving public health, preventing epidemics, promoting hygiene practices and behaviors, and preventing the spread of disease. A total of 18,318 people benefited from these kits.



A Lifeline for nearly 25,000 IDPs monthly

Years of conflict have pushed basic services in Yemen to the brink of collapse, particularly the water sector. Marib Governorate, which hosts the largest number of IDPs in the country, suffers from limited water supplies, especially in displacement camps.

To address these challenges, HUMAN ACCESS, supported by the AMUDA Association, is working to improve access to clean water for the most vulnerable displaced people in Marib, as part of the humanitarian response

to urgent needs in the water and sanitation sector.

The intervention included the establishment of 50 fixed water distribution points by installing reinforced concrete bases and 2,000-liter plastic water tanks at each point. These points are distributed across five displacement camps: Al-Suwaida, Al-Jufaina, Al-Mathaf, Al-Salam, and Al-Sharika.

Since the beginning of 2025, all the plastic water tanks have been supplied daily and regularly with 100,000 liters of potable water, benefiting

approximately 25,000 people. This has helped them maintain their health, care for their families, and rebuild their lives with dignity.

A number of displaced people who benefited expressed their thanks and gratitude for this vital intervention, which provides them with a source of clean and safe water. They emphasized that the problem of providing potable water was among the biggest challenges they faced before this intervention, which contributes to restoring their sense of security and stability.

Hope Flows in Tabalah Camp

In Al-Shihr District, Hadhramaut Governorate, 96 displaced families in Tabalah camp faced dire choices regarding access to water. They were forced to travel long distances to fetch it, impacting their health, safety, and social stability. Halima Sadiq*, a 35-year-old displaced woman, summarized this years-long ordeal: “The problem of providing clean water was one of our biggest challenges. I would spend hours worrying when my children went to fetch

water, fearing they might be harmed during the journey from distant locations.”

To alleviate the suffering of these most vulnerable displaced people, HUMAN ACCESS in 2025, in partnership with the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF), extended the water network to the camp and provided water collection and storage containers as part of a multi-sectoral assistance project to save lives in acutely vulnerable populations.

Camp residents felt immediate relief when water became more accessible. Among the beneficiaries was Bilal

Hasan, 40, who said, “I am so happy that there is a water network in the camp. The journey to fetch water was a daily nightmare, and taking a daily shower was a dream.” Displaced person Sadiq Salem, 33, echoed this sentiment, saying, “You have eased our financial burdens. We can now focus on caring for our children and rebuilding our lives. Providing water is a great relief and contributes to improving our lives. I thank HUMAN ACCESS and the Yemen Humanitarian Fund for this support.”

Food Security and Livelihoods



9,815 Refugees in Kharaz Camp Benefit from Food Aid

With funding from the World Food Program (WFP), HUMAN ACCESS in Lahj Governorate distributed food baskets containing a variety of items, benefiting 9,815 refugees in Kharaz camp. This distribution is part of regular food assistance aimed at alleviating the burdens on the most vulnerable refugee families and meeting their basic food needs amidst the difficult economic and living conditions prevailing in Yemen.

Emergency food aid distributed to 20,250 needy families

With successful and rapid field operations, HUMAN ACCESS branch in Taiz Governorate completed the distribution of the first round of food aid under the Targeted Emergency Food Assistance Project, funded by the World Food Program (WFP). This first round of distribution this year targeted 6,945 families in Sala District and 13,305 families in Al-Muzaffar District. The distributed food aid included essential food items to meet the families' daily needs, aiming to enhance food security and improve

the living conditions of the most vulnerable and impoverished groups.

Several beneficiaries expressed their gratitude to HUMAN ACCESS and the World Food Program for this humanitarian support, which addressed their immediate needs. They emphasized their immense happiness at receiving this aid, which saved them from hunger amidst the challenging circumstances caused by the ongoing conflict in Yemen.





Emergency Response and Shelter

HUMAN ACCESS Responds to Storm-Affected Families in Mokha

In response to the emergency appeal launched by the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), HUMAN ACCESS implemented an urgent relief intervention to

support families affected by the recent storm in Mokha District, Taiz Governorate. The intervention included the delivery of food baskets containing essential supplies, as well as

shelter materials including blankets and mattresses, in an effort to alleviate the suffering of those affected by the storm and enhance their resilience in the face of climate and natural disasters.



Food aid distributed to 400 displaced and affected families



With funding from the Jansuyu Organization, the HUMAN ACCESS branch in Marib Governorate distributed food baskets containing basic food items to 400 displaced families affected by the recent rains and floods in the governorate, to alleviate the suffer-

ing of the most vulnerable groups, who are facing deteriorating conditions with climate change and the worsening of the protracted crisis in Yemen.

A Dream Come True: Prefabricated Homes Delivered to 16 Orphan Families



With funding from the Turkish Orphan Foundation, the HUMAN ACCESS branch in Marib Governorate delivered prefabricated mobile homes (caravans) to 16 orphan families in displacement camps. Each caravan contains two rooms, a kitchen, and a bathroom, along with essential supplies and built to high standards that prioritize safety and security.

The handover ceremony was attended by the Deputy Governor of Marib, Dr. Abdurabbo Miftah, and several local officials. This vital humanitarian support aims to empower the beneficiary orphan families to enjoy a better life, protect them from harsh weather conditions, and help them regain a sense of dignity and security.



During the handover, the Deputy Governor of Marib praised the efforts of the HUMAN ACCESS branch and the support of the Turkish Orphan Foundation. He stated that these humanitarian interventions have a significant positive impact on the lives of vulnerable groups, respond to urgent needs, and contribute to building the capacity of the local community. The beneficiary families expressed their thanks and gratitude for this humanitarian gesture that revived hope in their hearts, and confirmed that these prefabricated houses provide them with privacy and meet their actual needs, amid increasing needs in a long-term crisis due to the ongoing conflict in Yemen.



KSrelief Center distributes shelter services to displaced people in several governorates

The King Salman Humanitarian Aid and Relief Center (KSrelief) distributed 100 tents and 400 shelter kits to displaced families affected by the recent weather depression in Al-Rayyan area of Al-Jawf Governorate. This distribution is part of the fifth phase of the emergency shelter aid project in Yemen, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS.

The distribution was launched in the presence of Mohammed Al-Ghanmi, head of the Executive Unit for IDP Camp Management in Al-Jawf, who emphasized the importance of this urgent shelter aid in providing a minimum level of shelter and protection for families affected by the recent weather depression.

In Abyan Governorate, the KSrelief Center distributed 61 shelter kits and 39 tents in Al-Arq and Al-Madina camps in Mudiyah District, benefiting 503 people. This distribution is also part of the fifth phase of the emergency shelter assistance project in Yemen, implement-

ed by HUMAN ACCESS.

In Marib Governorate, the Center distributed 300 shelter kits and 200 tents in Bathaa Al-Mil camp for internally displaced persons (IDPs), as part of the fifth phase of the emergency shelter assistance project in Yemen, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS. The distribution was launched in the presence of Marib Deputy Governor Abdullah Al-Bakri, who praised this urgent shelter aid for displaced communities severely affected by the recent storm that struck the governorate. Additionally, nine shelter kits and nine tents were distributed in Al-Jufaina Al-Sufra camp, benefiting 32 displaced people affected by the recent fire in the camp. This shelter assistance is part of the ongoing relief and humanitarian efforts provided by the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, through the KSrelief Center, to alleviate the suffering of the brotherly Yemeni people due to the humanitarian crisis they are experiencing.



Vital support for IDP families helps them cope with cold waves

With funding from Muslim Hands, HUMAN ACCESS distributed winter kits containing blankets and winter clothing, as well as food baskets containing flour and rice, to 223 families in Al-Munaij camp for internally displaced persons (IDPs) in Al-Ma'afer district of Taiz Governorate. This initiative aims to alleviate the hardships faced by these most vulnerable and needy families, especially with the intensifying cold wave during the winter season, amidst the worsening humanitarian crisis

resulting from the ongoing conflict in Yemen. In Marib Governorate, HUMAN ACCESS, with funding from the Turkish Orphan Foundation, distributed mattresses and winter clothing to 400 orphans in IDP camps. This is part of ongoing efforts to alleviate the suffering of these most vulnerable families, who face significant difficulties in accessing heating to cope with the cold waves sweeping Yemen, amidst increasing needs in a protracted crisis.





Health Services

Delivering medicines and medical supplies to four hospitals in Taiz

To ensure the continuation of life-saving reproductive health services, HUMAN ACCESS in Taiz Governorate delivered medicines, medical supplies, and laboratory reagents to Al-Mudhaffar General Hospital in Al-Mudhaffar District, the Yemeni-Swedish Maternity and Child Hospital in Al-Qahirah District, Al-Misrakh Central Hospital in Al-Misrakh District, and Khalifa General Hospital in Al-Shamaytain District.

This delivery is part of the ongoing support provided by the Reproductive Health Services Support Project, funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), in an effort to restore access to reproductive health services, which are considered essential and a human right, and help improve maternal and newborn health services in Yemen, which is experiencing one of the world's worst humanitarian crises.



Public Health Office and Al-Mahra's Al-Ghaydah Hospital honor HUMAN ACCESS



The Public Health and Population Office in Al-Mahra Governorate honored the HUMAN ACCESS Association in recognition of its ongoing efforts to support the health sector in the governorate, along with the completion of the project to renovate and equip the obstetrics emergency department at Al-Ghaydah Central Hospital. The administration of Al-Ghaydah Central Hospital also honored the HUMAN ACCESS Association in appreciation of its pioneering efforts and continuous support for reproductive health services at the hospital, within the context of the Reproductive Health Services Support Project, funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). At the two honoring ceremonies, Dr. Awad Mubarak, Director General of the Public Health Office in Al-Mahra, praised the vital and leading role played by HUMAN ACCESS, with the support of UNFPA, in strengthening the health sector's capabilities and providing life-saving medical services. Meanwhile, Mohsen Balhaf, Director General of Al-Ghaydah Hospital, emphasized the vital role played by the Reproductive Health Services Support Project in maintaining essential health services for the most vulnerable groups and increasing survival rates. The honoring ceremonies were attended by a number of officials and specialists from the Ministry of Health and health facilities in the governorate.

As part of ongoing support, 148 refugees receive medical services before their voluntary return to homeland

With funding from the UNHCR, and as part of ongoing support, the HUMAN ACCESS office in Aden Governorate provided health aid to 148 refugees voluntarily returning from Yemen to their country of origin, Somalia. This aid was provided within the framework of the integrated project and the Voluntary Return Program.

The health support included conducting necessary medical examinations to assess their health status and their ability to endure the rigors of travel. It also included providing prescribed medications for those suffering from chronic illnesses, as well as offering health guidance to ensure the refugees' safe and healthy return home.



Opening of Emergency Department in Kharaz Refugee Camp's Health Center

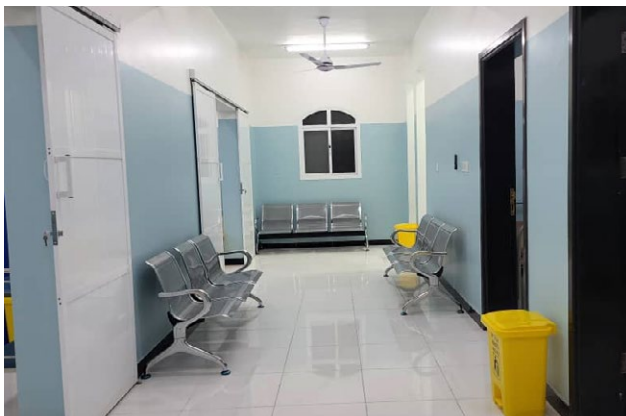
In a new humanitarian and development achievement, the Emergency Department at the Health Center in Kharaz Refugee Camp, Al-Madharibah Wa Ras Al-Arah District, Lahj Governorate, was inaugurated. The department was constructed by HUMAN ACCESS with funding from the Hungarian Aid Agency.

The opening ceremony was attended by the Director General of the Lahj Governorate Governor's Office, Khaled Al-Jawi; the Deputy Director General of the Governorate's Public Health and Population Office, Dr. Abdulhakim Naji; and the Secretary General of the District Local Council, Dr. Ali Ahmed Al-Alqami. Also present were the Somali Ambassador to Yemen, Abdulhakim Mohammed; the Director of the UNHCR Aden Office, Mohammed Rafiq; and a

number of camp residents who expressed their joy at this healthcare achievement.

During the opening, several speeches were delivered praising the efforts to complete this medical facility, highlighting its importance in supporting the health infrastructure and ensuring the sustainability of emergency medical services. This, in turn, contributes to strengthening the protection of the most vulnerable refugees and members of the host community.

The emergency department at the health center will improve the response to critical cases and provide emergency health services to over 20,000 residents of Kharaz camp and surrounding areas, who face challenges in accessing basic healthcare services amid a protracted humanitarian crisis in Yemen.





Protection Services

New Job Opportunities Created for 32 Women



HUMAN ACCESS continues to create opportunities for women and contribute to social and economic development through the activities of the project “Providing Livelihood Services for the Most Vulnerable Women and Girls in Yemen,” funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). In Ataq, Shabwa Governorate, 26 women received henna art training during a 10-day course. They also acquired life, marketing, and financial skills to enable them to enter the job market and launch their own businesses.

In Al-Rawda, Marib Governorate, six women received livelihood grants, involving essential supplies, after completing vocational training in sewing and

tailoring, and confectionery and pastry making. This training will allow them to enter the job market and compete in local markets.

Livelihood grants were also awarded to 12 women who benefited from vocational training in sewing, skincare and perfume making, and pastry making. These grants, offered to beneficiaries in Al-Wadi District and Al-Jufaina camp for displaced persons, included basic professional tools that enable them to engage in the Yemeni labor market, achieve financial self-sufficiency for themselves and their families, and transform into productive families capable of facing the challenges and deteriorating living conditions in Yemen due to the ongoing conflict.

HUMAN ACCESS supports perfume and body oil production training



With support from HUMAN ACCESS, the Literacy and Adult Education Department in Dar Saad District, Aden Governorate, conducted a training activity on perfume and body oil production for 14 women, as part of its literacy program.

Under the supervision of the General Directorate of Literacy and Adult Education in Aden, the trainees acquired the basic skills for this income-generating career along with practical applications to help them enter the job market and improve their living conditions.

Sustainable income opportunities created for 45 young men and women

With funding from Japan and in partnership with UNHCR, the HUMAN ACCESS branch in Marib Governorate granted vocational training kits in refrigeration and air conditioning, auto electrical work, and mobile phone repair to 45 young men and women from displacement camps. This followed their vocational training in these income-generating fields, as part of the integrated project's activities.

During the handover, Marib Deputy Governor Judge

Abdullah Al-Bakri praised these high-quality programs aimed at training young men and women and empowering them with the necessary tools to create economic projects that meet the needs of the labor market.

Mr. Shekelkam Shehu, Head of the UNHCR office in Marib, emphasized the importance of vocational training and business skills development to improve livelihoods for the most vulnerable groups in Yemen.



Shabwa: 60 women benefit from vocational training and livelihood grants in 3 months



HUMAN ACCESS in Shabwa Governorate achieved several milestones in supporting, protecting, and empowering women during the last quarter of 2025. This was within the framework of the project to provide livelihood services to the most vulnerable women and girls in Yemen, funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).

In the area of vocational training, 54 women in Ataq city received training in sewing and tailoring, incense and perfume making, henna art, and concrete and resin art. This training, delivered according to high professional standards, prepares them to enter the

job market, improves their living standards, and helps them achieve financial self-sufficiency for themselves and their families.

The efforts were not limited to vocational training, but extended to the delivery of livelihood grants, where tools for practicing the profession were offered to 6 women who benefited from training in the fields of sewing, and the manufacture of incense and perfumes, to help them to engage in the labor market, and to transform into productive families that can face the challenges and the deteriorating living conditions in the country

As part of the project to provide livelihood services to the most vulnerable women and girls in Yemen, funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), HUMAN ACCESS in Shabwa Governorate conducted a community awareness session with 26 women in Ataq city.

The session addressed two main topics: women's rights and their legal protection, and negative thoughts, their impact on mental health, and how to overcome them. The goal was to raise awareness of women's rights in all aspects of life and to support mental health, which has become more urgent than ever.

Ongoing efforts to support rights and well-being of women and girls





Educational activities

Bright efforts illuminate the path to learning: Distribution of 3,185 school bags in Aden

Under the patronage of the Minister of Education, Tariq Al-Akbari, and with funding from the European Union Humanitarian Aid, HUMAN ACCESS in Aden Governorate, in partnership with Save the Children, distributed school bags to students at Al-Lahoum Educational Complex School in Dar Saad District. The distribution process took place under the supervision of the Aden Education Office, and in the pres-

ence of Anis Abdo, Director of the Dar Saad District Education Office. It included the distribution of 3,185 school bags and supplies to students, as part of a project to provide integrated support in the areas of protection and education for girls and boys affected by the conflict in southern Yemen. The project aims to enhance learning opportunities and alleviate the financial burden of education on families.



Hundreds of Teachers Receive Kits in Several Governorates

With funding from the European Union Humanitarian Aid, HUMAN ACCESS, in partnership with Save the Children, delivered teacher kits in the governorates of Lahj, Taiz, and Aden. This initiative is part of a project providing integrated support in the areas of protection and education for girls and boys affected by the conflict in southern Yemen.

In Aden Governorate, 90 teachers received kits at Al-Lahoum Educational Complex School in Dar Saad District. This distribu-

tion is part of ongoing efforts to support the education sector in Yemen, contributing to the continuity of educational services and improving the quality of teaching and learning in line with the Sustainable Development Goals.

In Lahj Governorate, 55 kits were distributed at the Martyr Iqbal Basic and Secondary School in Tuban District.

In Taiz Governorate, 34 kits were distributed at Al-Khansa Basic School in Sala District, and 65 kits at the Martyr Al-Hakimi

School in Al-Muzaffar District.

Each kit contains essential tools for teachers to facilitate their educational mission and enhance the quality of the learning process.

This service activity comes after the distribution of school bags, containing the necessary tools, to 500 male and female students in the governorates of Aden, Lahj and Taiz, to encourage students to return to school, reduce the phenomenon of children dropping out of schools, and enhance learning opportunities.



3,000 Orphans return to school with hearts full of hope and joy



With funding from the Turkish Diyanet Foundation, HUMAN ACCESS delivered school bags containing essential school supplies to 1,000 male and female orphans, in addition to supplying school uniforms to 2,000 male and female orphans in the

governorates of Aden, Taiz, and Marib. This initiative aims to facilitate access to education for the most vulnerable orphans and encourage them to return to school.





Training and Workshops

Training 30 field volunteers to assess education needs in affected communities

With funding from the European Union Humanitarian Aid and in partnership with Save the Children, HUMAN ACCESS organized a training course for volunteers involved in the comprehensive assessment of education needs in affected communities. This initiative is part of the project to provide integrated

protection and educational support for boys and girls affected by conflict in southern Yemen. The two-day training targeted 30 field volunteers from the governorates of Aden, Lahj, and Taiz. The key objective of the course was to equip them with the theoretical and practical skills necessary to conduct a vulnerability assess-

ment survey and identify barriers to education for children and families affected by the conflict. This will be achieved through the accurate and ethical application of data collection tools, ensuring the identification of the most vulnerable groups and the targeting of appropriate educational interventions.



Training for Al-Basateen Medical Center Staff on New Electronic System



HUMAN ACCESS in Aden Governorate carried out a comprehensive workshop for the staff of Al-Basateen Charitable Medical Center in Dar Saad District on the new electronic system for managing the center.

The workshop included an explanation of the integrated system's operation and practical training for the medical center's staff, in preparation for launching the new system in the coming days. The aim is to improve the quality of services provided by the center, which offers essential medical care to refugees and the host community.

Workshop discussing contemporary environmental challenges in Shabwa

Under the patronage of the Governor of Shabwa Governorate, Sheikh Awad Mohammed bin Al-Wazir, the HUMAN ACCESS branch in Shabwa, in partnership with the local office of the General Authority for Environmental Protection, organized a workshop entitled “Towards a Green Environment and a Sustainable Future: Contemporary Environmental Challenges and Approaches to Addressing Them.” With 20 participants in attendance, the workshop, held in Ataq city, discussed several important topics and reviewed the most significant environmental

challenges in Shabwa Governorate, including oil spill pollution, desertification, sanitation problems, the spread of epidemics, and overfishing. The workshop concluded with a set of recommendations for addressing environmental challenges in Shabwa in light of climate change. It emphasized the importance of raising environmental awareness within the community and the need to advance environmental work in the governorate through partnership and coordination between official bodies and civil society organizations.



Three vocational training courses for 50 women in Al-Mahra



HUMAN ACCESS in Al-Ghaydah, Al-Mahra Governorate, conducted three training courses in sewing and tailoring, pastry making, and incense and perfume making. These courses were part of a project to provide livelihood services to the most vulnerable women and girls in Yemen, funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).



The training courses targeted 50 women, aiming to equip them with essential skills in these income-generating crafts. This will enhance their readiness to integrate into the local labor market, opening up real opportunities for self-reliance, improving their standard of living, and contributing to their own and their families' economic and social stability.

Thirteen women acquire essential life, financial, and marketing skills

HUMAN ACCESS in Marib Governorate concluded a life, financial, and marketing skills training course for 13 women who had benefited from vocational training in sewing, tailoring, and incense and perfume making in Al-Wadi District. This was part of the pro-

ject to provide livelihood services to the most vulnerable women and girls in Yemen, funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).

The course helped the women beneficiaries acquire essential life, financial, and marketing

skills, enabling them to enter the job market, market their own projects, and adapt positively to professional and personal challenges, thus ensuring their success.



Young Shaima: Empowerment Overcomes Disability



This is a unique and inspiring success story of a young Yemeni woman in her thirties who defied the odds and whose disability did not prevent her from becoming self-reliant and contributing to society and the economy, despite the abuse she has suffered since childhood. This is the story of Shaima (a pseudonym used for privacy and protection), who is deaf and mute and lives in Al-Wadi District, Marib Governorate. A sign language teacher was consulted to write her success story, which reflects a bright aspect of a project providing livelihood services to the most vulnerable women and girls in Yemen.

Disability, Orphanhood, and Violence:

Shaima lived a three-dimensional tragedy. As a child, she was bullied because of her disability, and her father, who had always stood by her, passed away prematurely. As an adult, she experienced violence rooted in social dynamics.

Yemen is among the countries experiencing high levels of violence against women due to social, cultural, economic, and other factors. This serious phenomenon has been exacerbated by the humanitarian crisis the country is experiencing as a result of the conflict.

Shaima, 23, found herself isolated from society, and her mental state was deteriorating. However, like others who are deaf and mute, she possesses a sharp intellect and keen insight, a gift from God to compensate for her inability to hear and speak.

According to her conversation with a sign language interpreter, she noticed some women and girls frequenting a safe space run by HUMAN ACCESS in Marib Al-Wadi. This space is part of a project providing livelihood services to the most vulnerable women and

girls in Yemen, funded by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). Shaima sensed, with genuine conviction, that this place was working to support and protect women, so she decided to go there in search of safety and care. The staff at the safe space realized that behind this young woman lay a story of suffering, and with the help of a sign language interpreter, they were able to understand her struggles and aspirations. The safe space for women and girls immediately began playing its vital role in rehabilitating and empowering her. Despite the challenging circumstances, success was achieved, transforming Shaima into a success story and an inspiration to many others.

Psychological Support and Vocational Training:

Due to a life of deprivation, domestic violence, and societal neglect, Shaima desperately needed relief from the psychological trauma she suffered to be able to move forward. Therefore, providing psychological support was the first priority.

After assessing her talents and abilities, she was trained in sewing to set her on a path to success and contribution. The trainer gave her special attention, and because Shaima is quick-witted, she was able to acquire the skills of this craft, which is in high demand in the local job market. After completing her vocational training, she was provided with a sewing machine and its accessories, enabling her to work from home and earn a living. To further enhance her skills, she was selected for an additional training course in October 2025. Now, Shaima sews clothes with great passion, showcasing her creations that reveal creativity and professionalism. She has been able to provide for herself, her mother, and her two sisters, who share the same disability. She has become a beacon of hope thanks to the Livelihood Services Project for the Most Vulnerable Women and Girls in Yemen. This project, based on principles of social responsibility, contributes to empowering people with disabilities, improving their lives, and helping them integrate into society, thus creating an inclusive community in line with the Sustainable Development Goals.

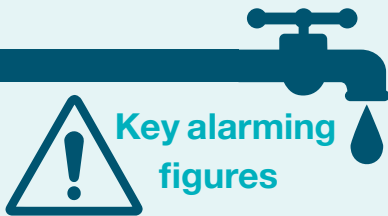
Commenting on this humanitarian support, Shaima told the sign language interpreter that she has come to love life. She added that she no longer needs help from others and is no longer as afraid as before. She aspires to own a large sewing workshop and is ready to train any woman with a similar disability in the art of sewing.
